WHAT IS OLLI?

OLLI is an acronym for The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Bradley University, an organization of more than 1,200 members and who want to stay vital and active as they reach and enjoy retirement. One of the best ways to do that is to keep learning, and OLLI offers many options to do so.

Our members enjoy the best of life-after-50 with a diverse collection of year-round programs, including non-credit classes, educational travel, study groups, and special events. Our online options allow members to learn via Zoom, a free and easy-to-use video conferencing program.

Please review our program offerings, both in-person and online, so you can pick what best fits your learning preferences, interests, and schedule.

OLLI Originals are exclusive talks with local leaders and businesses from the community and beyond. These one–hour sessions are a great way to stay informed about local issues, governmental updates, and business updates.



Study Groups offer opportunities to investigate topics in depth, and are your connection to studying what you most enjoy with people who share your enthusiasm. The groups are participation—based; the facilitators deliver core learning material, but all participants learn by sharing. Participants should expect to read, watch a video, or complete other independent study outside of each group session. Groups start at various times throughout the month, and usually meet for 1.5 to 2 hours for 4-6 weeks. Seats are often limited to 15-25 participants so everyone has an opportunity to actively participate.

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Learning Trips

enable members to interact with experts who offer behind-the-



scenes looks at area businesses, and regional, national, and worldwide attractions. Our online "Travel Beyond" trips let members travel virtually via Zoom. Our hybrid "Support Local" includes a curbside meal pickup followed by a Zoom presentation that allows members to go behind the scenes with owners and chefs.

Online Social Events are hosted by OLLI volunteers several times a month. Each free happy hour has a theme, but you don't have to share – just pop in and enjoy!

Online Zoom Training sessions help members learn how to use the software on their computers, tablets, or smartphones. Led by OLLI volunteers and free to all, our goal is to help members feel comfortable with the technology so they can enjoy their OLLI Online experiences.

OLLI Classes offer learning about the topics you choose, taught by engaging volunteer instructors, on a college campus, with people your age, and no tests or grades. Add time for socializing, and you have a sense of what we love to do. Classes meet at Bradley University



on Wednesdays in April and October, and we're working on a new program format for January and February. We provide a friendly, welcoming environment on campus, with free park—and—ride service to drop you off at the front door. Classes are held at 9:00, 10:30, 12:30, and 2:00 and with our new a la carte registration you can sign up for 1, 2, 3, or all 4 each day.

1.9/11, Newfoundland, and Broadway: **An Unlikely Connection**

September 11, 2001 was a tragic day for the United States. Sixteen years later, an award-winning play, Come From Away, premiered on Broadway, and wove together stories of extraordinary kindnesses extended to the 7,000 people on the 38 diverted planes that landed in Newfoundland. In this class, we'll explore the history and culture of the residents who compassionately assisted the frightened and confused people on the planes, the relationships built during those fateful few days after 9/11, and how a young Canadian couple turned the tragedy into a thoughtful theatrical experience.

2. Beginning Watercolor (located at Peoria Art Guild)

New Developments in Cancer Therapy

One of OLLI's most popular past classes is back. Dr. Michael Veeder, oncologist/infectious medicine/internal medicine physician and partner at Illinois Cancer Care since 1982, will address the following topics: what is cancer; surgery, radiation, and chemotherapy; targeted therapy; and immune therapy.

5. How to Navigate a Senseless Market

Fundamentals of a company and the stock market in general are always relevant, but it is equally essential to also look at the technical data. In fact, in times like this it is vitally important to look at history to help one navigate today's market. Technical analysis helps you make smarter decisions when it comes to your investments. In an understandable way, this class will cover looking at candlestick chart patterns, stock's price and volume, supply and demand, moving averages, money flow, point and figure charting, past market data, seasonal patterns, and much, much more. 6. Origami: Amazing Models from Paper

Let's fold paper! We will create some marvelous, unique, and entertaining models, starting with a beginner session so anyone who is a true novice folder will understand the

basics of Origami. All materials will be provided - just bring your hands! Be ready to learn a new skill, train your brain, get some instant gratification from your creative work, and take what you learn to your friends and family. \$30 – Class instructor is Steve Richards, who has been an Origami instructor for more than 40 years (RI/RC)

7. Research Advances in Stem Cells and Tissue Regeneration

In this class, Dr. Craig Cady will discuss advances in research in stem cells and tissue regeneration. Topics will include basic biology of stem cells and newly discovered sources of stem cells (including iPS stem cells), nanotechnology, new approaches to genetic engineering, and clinical advances in neurodegenerative diseases, diabetes, and cancer. The final class will be presented by two research students from the laboratory on new research into the lethal aspects of "cancer stem cells" and the production of a fully implantable artificial lung using nanofiber materials and stem cells.

8. Troy: Myth, Legend, History, and it's Relevance Today

OR ONLINE Why, more than 3,000 year after the war, is Troy still relevant? In this class, we will take a look at the people and events on the Trojan side of the war, as opposed to that of the Greeks described by Homer. We'll discuss Troy's connection to Rome and Carthage and its political relevance today. Class content will be based on the ancient writers Virgil, Apollodorus, and Euripides, the archaeological findings of Heinrich Schliemann, and the work of modern political author Barbara Tuchman.

II. Cognitive Reframing: **Techniques to Reverse Pandemic Funk**

Over the past 18 months of the pandemic, popular blogs posted by psychologists working in academic settings have focused on their observations about changes they have witnessed in themselves (and others) in the ways they have been relating (both internally and externally) to the chaotic world around them. This has been called "mind shrinking," "stuck in a rut," and "languishing," among other terms. This phenomenon will be explored during our class as we examine the research undertaken by these social scientists, with an end point of allowing course participants, who perhaps recognize these changes in themselves, to begin to practice re-capturing contentment, and even flourishing, in life.

I2. Energy – Domestic and Worldwide:An Industry in Transition

This course will explore the rapidly changing electrical generation market in the United States and the world. Ever wonder why Connecticut has the highest electricity rates and Washington State the lowest? We will discuss renewable power sources and the challenges we face attempting to store that power when the wind doesn't blow and the sun doesn't shine. We will explore how and where greenhouse gas emissions are generated. We will also dig into the energy related mining industry including modern critical minerals such as lithium and cobalt. Lastly, we'll turn to the automotive industry, discussing the transition to electric vehicles, comparing their costs, and describing their charging times.

13. Financial Markets Over the Years

This class will explore financial markets over the years and discuss what lessons might be learned from our history. Each week we'll explore a market/economic downturn including the Great Depression, 1973–1974, the Tech Bubble, 2008-2009, and the most recent COVID 19 Shutdown. We will dive into what actually happened economically during each time period, and discuss the causes. We will also learn some stock analysis techniques that were important in each time period. 14. Literary Lions: A Profile of Four Authors October 6 – C.S. Lewis

C.S. Lewis may be more modern than you think. In this class, we'll take a look at how Lewis was ahead of his time. He wrote Young Adult fiction (Narnia stories), science fiction (Space Trilogy), and non-fiction (Christian apologetics, autobiographical works, and explorations on topics such as the meaning of pain). He was a scholar, writing and teaching at Oxford University for almost 30 years, with a multi-media presence, recording 15-minute talks on BBC Radio during World War II. Class instructor is Terry Bibo Knight, a writer and journalist who spent more than three decades at the *Peoria Journal Star*. (RI/NC)

October 13 - Gene Stratton-Porter

Gene Stratton–Porter is mostly forgotten now, but she was an influential author of popular fiction, writing 12 novels, seven nature books, two books of poetry, children's books and numerous magazine articles. Her most popular novels were *A Girl of the Limberlost* and *Freckles*; both have been made into movies five times, from 1917 to 1960. Current and past critics justifiably complained that her work is too sentimental

and romantic. Gene lived from 1863 until 1924, spending much of her life near the Limberlost Swamp in northeastern Indiana. She was a fascinating person, worth remembering and studying because of her devotion to the wetlands, their beauty, and their importance to the ecology of the Midwest. Class instructor is Janet Lange, Executive Director of Continuing Education, Emeritus. (RI/NC)

October 20 - Colson Whitehead

Colson Whitehead won the 2017 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for *The Underground Railroad* and the 2020 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for *The Nickel Boys*, making him one of just four authors who have won this award twice. In July 2020, at the age of 50, he received the Library of Congress Prize for American Fiction – the youngest person to receive the award for a lifetime of work. Librarian of Congress Carla Hayden noted that his work "is informed by probing insights into the human condition and empathy for those who struggle with life's sometimes harrowing vicissitudes." Class participants will learn about Colson Whitehead's life and works. Class instructor is Roberta Koscielski, Deputy Director of the Peoria Public Library and frequent OLLI instructor. (RI/NC)

October 27 - Kurt Vonnegut

Satirical, sardonic, controversial, complicated, humorous, humanist, anti—war, avant—garde — all describe Kurt Vonnegut, a lion of twentieth century literature. Born in Indianapolis almost one hundred years ago, he found his audience with the counterculture of the Sixties and Seventies. He was categorized as a science fiction writer, a designation that fit him as poorly as his perpetually rumpled clothing. As we will see in our hour together, his life was as unconventional as his fiction. As he said, "I myself am a work of fiction." And so it goes. Class instructor is Gary Nelson, retired attorney and current OLLI Study Group chair. (RI/NC) \$30 – Class instructors are listed above.

15. Margaret Sanger, Woman Rebel

Meet Margaret Sanger, free speech and birth control advocate, author, and eugenicist. Her newsletter, *The Woman Rebel*, published in the early 1900s when birth control was a taboo subject, she called upon women of her day to reject their destiny of large families, poor health, and early death. On the downside, Sanger became a strong advocate of the eugenics movement, tarnishing her reputation as a game—changer for good. We will cover her early life and work as a nurse working with women in Greenwich Village, her challenge to the Comstock Act, which prohibited distribution of birth control information through the mail, her involvement in the eugenics movement, and her later life and connection to the modern birth control movement.

16. This is What We Believe

We often drive by a church and all we see is the facade. We have little knowledge of the history of the denomination, its beliefs, and how the members worship. Each week, a different clergy member will give you information about their faith and beliefs.

Infrastructure is everywhere! It's an integral part of our everyday lives that often goes overlooked. Learn about Peoria Public Works in this enriching session where you'll engage with our Public Works Director, Deputy Director/ City Engineer and the Deputy Director of Operations. Topics will include the ins and outs of the Engineering and Operations Divisions and some of the major projects underway. Participants will also delve into winter weather planning efforts involving the snow removal and ice control plan and hear about year-round pavement preservation efforts. Plus, to top things off – you'll learn how Peoria Public Works works hand in glove with other departments and the City as a whole to enhance the safety and quality of life of Peoria citizens.

19. Invasive Plants, Weeds, and Native Plant Alternatives

This class will explore many invasive plant species found in our landscape, weeds, and the alternative use of native plants. We'll explore why some plants end up becoming invasive, discuss some invaders that are still in the ornamental trade, and review ways to influence the surrounding natural landscapes through planning decisions. Weed control is a necessary evil that can be back breaking and wrist aching. A discussion of various types of weed control methods and gardening practices while some weed

controls work better than others. Learn how you can do your part in your own backyard designing your landscape with Illinois native plants that nurture and feed our little friends that bring you joy and require minimal care. \$30 – Class instructor is Lee Maki, University of Illinois Extension Master Gardener / Master Naturalist. 20. Let's Do A Show: The Anatomy and Physiology of a Theatrical Production.

In this class we will examine the entire process of presenting a theatrical production, from script selection to opening night, with a focus on amateur theatre. Rebbeca Bourland is a lifelong Peorian who has been involved in local theatre since 1953. She'll share her insights on writing, performing, and directing from her experiences at Corn Stock, Peoria Players, and Illinois Central College.

21. Medicare Made Easy

We'll review the three "Missions" of the Commission related to transportation, environment and land use/community planning services. Then we'll profile projects or initiatives for which Tri—County takes primary responsibility for executing in the service area of Peoria, Tazewell and Woodford Counties and others where the Commission plays a collaborating role. The roles of Commissioners and professional planning staff will also be discussed.

October 13 - Transportation

This week we'll discuss the Commission's role as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) through which funding from the Federal Highway Administration and Illinois Department of Transportation flow to meet the transportation infrastructure needs of our communities. The modes of transportation which are addressed range from non–motorized walking and biking to most forms of roadworthy motorized vehicles and waterborne "vehicles". By example, the coordinator for the Illinois Department of Transportation's HSTP (Human Statewide Transportation Plan) program will review how it enhances transit mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities, particularly those living in rural areas, and will discuss the Long–Range Transportation Plan.

October 20 – Environment

We'll have insights on the varied projects undertaken by the Commission and staff as they impact the air, water and land of the Tri—County area. From air quality to water resource conservation and erosion control, they all greatly affect the quality of life of both residents and visitors. So, regional aquifer capacities and levels, harvesting invasive Asian Carp and finding a beneficial use of the dredge material choking Upper and Lower Peoria Lakes will just be a few of the many environmental issues to be touched on during this program.

October 27 – Land Use /Community Development

This week our planners will offer their perspective on the planning tasks undertaken by the Commission and staff. From the collection and management of important data and attributes for rural and urban areas using Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to leadership in conducting Comprehensives Plans for communities, commission staff professionals are quite adept, nimble and capable of a variety of planning tasks for communities of all sizes. \$30 – Class instructors are Eric Miller, Executive Director, Ray Lees, Planning Program Manager, Ryan Harms, Transportation Planning III, Reema Abi–Akar, Planner II, Michael Bruner, Planner II, and Andrew Hendon, GIS Planner III, Tri–County Regional Planning Commission. PARKING FOR CLASSES

We offer a "park—and—ride" option so you can park in large lots near campus and enjoy drop—off service at the front door of the Michel Student Center. Information will be mailed with your class schedule.

If you choose to park at Shea Stadium, located near the Ag Lab at the corner of University and Nebraska avenues, a Peoria Charter Coach will transport you to and from campus. If you park at Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1420 W. Moss Avenue, the OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus.

Volunteer parking coordinators are located at both sites to assist you with your parking needs.

Because OLLI provides park—and—ride service, OLLI members are not allowed to park anywhere on campus (including the Visitor's Lot) or in Campustown. If you park in these areas and receive a ticket, you will not be eligible for an appeal and will be required to pay the fine.

CLASS PARKING PERMITS

For our members taking classes who have state—issued handicapped placards or license plates AND are physically unable to utilize our door—to—door shuttle service from Shea Stadium and Westminster Church, we have a very limited supply of handicapped—accessible parking permits for use during classes. At a cost of \$10 each, these permits allow you to park in a handicapped or white—lined space on campus for the Welcome Back Event and all four class dates. All requests must be made via telephone to Bonnie Davis at (309) 677–2523 NO LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 10, 2021. When you call, please be prepared to provide your license plate number, your placard number and expiration date, and the make, model, year, and color of your vehicle.

For learning trips, we provide reserved parking in the Campustown shopping center (across the street from Bradley), the departure location for our trips. 
- \$10 minimum cancellation fee
