WHAT IS OLL!?

OLLI is an acronym for The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Bradley University, an organization with an average of 1,000 annual members who want to stay vital and active as they reach and enjoy retirement. One of the best ways to do that is to keep learning, and OLLI offers many options to do so.

Our members enjoy the best of life-after-50 with a diverse collection of year-round programs, including non-credit classes, educational travel, study groups, and special events. Our online options allow members to learn via Zoom, a free and easy-to-use video conferencing program.

Please review our program offerings, both in-person and online, so you can pick what best fits your learning preferences, interests, and schedule.

Classes offer learning about the topics you choose, taught by engaging volunteer instructors, on a college campus, with people your age, and no tests or grades. Add time for socializing, and you have a sense of what we love to do. Classes meet



at Bradley University on Wednesdays in April and October, and we're working on a new program format for January and February. Our Winter in-person classes provide a friendly, welcoming environment with free parking on campus. Hybrid and Zoom classes are also available.

Originals are exclusive talks with local leaders and businesses from the community and beyond. These one-hour sessions are a great way to stay informed about local issues, governmental updates, and business updates.

Study Groups offer opportunities to investigate topics in depth, and are your connection to studying what you most enjoy with people who share your enthusiasm. The groups are participation—based; the facilitators deliver core learning material, but all participants learn by sharing. Participants should expect to read, watch a video, or complete other independent study outside of each group session. Groups start at various times throughout the month, and usually meet for 1.5 to 2 hours for 4-6 weeks. Seats are often limited to 15-25 participants so everyone has an opportunity to actively participate.

Learning Trips enable members to interact with experts who offer behind-thescenes looks at area businesses, and regional, national, and



worldwide attractions. Our online "Travel Beyond" trips let members travel virtually via Zoom. Our hybrid "Support Local" includes a curbside meal pickup followed by a Zoom presentation that allows members to go behind the scenes with owners and chefs.

OLLI Online programs are run via Zoom and include hybrid Classes, Originals, and Study Groups. This also include our free online social events and Zoom training,

I. 9/II, Newfoundland, and Broadway: An Unlikely Connection

September 11, 2001 was a tragic day for the United States. Sixteen years later, an award-winning play, *Come From Away*, Your Choice IN PERSON OR ONLINE

premiered on Broadway, and wove together stories of extraordinary kindnesses extended to the 7,000 people on the 38 diverted planes that landed in Newfoundland. In this class, we'll explore the history and culture of the residents who compassionately assisted the frightened and confused people on the planes, the relationships built during those fateful few days after 9/11, and how a young Canadian couple turned the tragedy into a thoughtful theatrical experience.

2. Amazing Adventures of Americans in 1800s Paris

This class was inspired by David McCullough's book *The Greater Journey*, when 19th century Paris was a world center for culture and medicine, attracting a fascinating group of Americans. We'll explore a combination of biography and culture, set against the turbulent background

of French politics. Participants will learn about the rigors of transatlantic travel, cholera epidemics, Native American Indians and Tom Thumb on display, plus an array of artists, musicians, writers, doctors, and ambassadors. Be ready to enjoy many great visual images!

3. Criminal Jury Trial: An Insider's View

In this class we will get a little more "down and dirty" about pre-trial maneuvering and tactics in getting the best jury for our side, plus war stories to illustrate the points. If you have served as a juror, witness, or defendant in a criminal trial, watched the reporting of a trial, or have been indicted (or expect to be indicted), then this course will certainly be of interest. We will look at a criminal trial from the standpoint of a judge, a prosecutor, and a defense attorney, and discuss jury selection, conduct of the trial, and closing argument. Time will be given to questions and discussion. \$30 – Class instructor is Art Inman, criminal defense attorney-at-law. (RI/RC)

4. Destination Mars

Mars has always beckoned to us from across the night sky. Over the centuries we've explored it with our telescopes, orbiting spacecraft, and robotic rovers, revealing a fascinating world full of mysteries and surprises. We're now closer than ever to exploring it in person with real astronauts, who will have to undertake an epic six-month voyage across the sea of space to reach our neighbor planet. Mars beckons! As a special treat, our final session will take place at the Peoria Riverfront Museum. \$30 – Class instructor is Nick Rae, senior planetarium educator at the Peoria Riverfront Museum. (NI/NC)

5. Exploring the Magical Garden World

Our abundance has often led us into a feeling that all the nourishment and beauty of nature "just happens." In this class Ella Maxwell, Master Gardener, will review considerations for selecting native plants and their roles in attracting pollinators in native habitats. Each plant has a preference for the type of soil conditions, sun exposure, and moisture requirements for a successful native garden. Ella will review her experiences as a beekeeper as well, discussing her work with native bees and honeybees. Wildlife in the garden provides interesting opportunities to view their behavior and may also be challenging for visitors. She will also provide an overview of the maintenance and pruning of plants that help keep a productive landscape.

6. It Played in Peoria: The History of Botulism

Next year marks the 40th anniversary of the Peoria Outbreak - the third largest botulism outbreak in the nation's history. Dozens of people became seriously ill after dining at The Skewer Inn in Northwoods Mall in Peoria in 1983. Within days, 28 people were hospitalized from a deadly toxin with no taste and no smell. Join us to learn "the rest of the story" from a researcher/scholar who specializes in long-term recovery of botulism. Guest speakers include Peorians with firsthand experience of this tragic event. The class will also cover the discovery of botulism, the canning industry crisis, early research tales from Stanford and Harvard, development of the antitoxin at the University of Illinois, botulism diagnostic criteria (then and now), and weaponization of botulinum toxin in WWII. \$30 – Class instructor is Dr. Jane Talkington, Associate Director of the Bradley University Turner School of Entrepreneurship and Innovation and an avid science

8. 2022 Midterm Illinois and National Elections: Key Insights

In this class, we'll discuss the key issues and political dynamics that will be at play in the federal and state elections in 2022. Will the majority control of Congress change? Who is running for Congress in Central Illinois? Will any changes occur in the Illinois government? Who are the local state legislative candidates running for office? Be ready for an engaging class with lively discussions; civil, respectful discourse is expected. \$30 – Class instructor is Brad McMillan, Executive Director, Institute for Principled Leadership in Public Service. 9. Bucking National Trends: How Peoria Addresses Drug Overdoses

In 2021, the number of local overdose deaths was reduced by 50% from the previous year – despite an increase throughout the US. In this class, you will met local leaders who will explain what makes Peoria different, illuminate how the work they do contributes to helping substance abusers survive, and provide up-to-date information on the state of the opioid epidemic in the Peoria area. \$30 – Class instructors include Dr. Henry Martin de Campo, Jodi Hoos, Peoria County State's Attorney, Chris Schaffner, Jolt Foundation, and Sgt. Justin Sinks, Peoria Police Department. (NI/RC)

10. Inherit the Wind: Evolution on Trial

Dive deep into the history of an idea that is important to our contemporary understanding of the world. *Inherit the Wind* recounts the famous 1925 "Scopes Monkey Trial," a landmark debate between evolutionists and creationists. During the class, we'll discuss Darwin's presence within the play. For example, Is Charles Darwin an additional, virtual character in the play? If so, what perspective does he add? We'll learn what's fact and what's fiction when it comes to natural selection. We'll also explore who gets to make meaning and knowledge – scientific and otherwise? We'll also ponder the eternal question: how does interpreting the past shed light on present ideas at play in our world? \$30 – Class instructor is Kathryn Eissfeldt, President of the Peoria Area World Affairs Council. 11. Living to 100: What We Know About Longevity, Health, and Functioning

We all wonder how long we might live. This class will allow all participants to preview several of the top influences on how long each of us might live. Key concepts related to this topic will be explored including genetics, environmental factors, socio-demographic factors, and quality of life. \$30 – Class instructor is Margie Getz, Associate Professor at Methodist College. We will start by covering her life as a slave, her exploits saving her family and other slaves, and the obstacles she faced in the underground railroad. We'll also review her work as a Union nurse, spy, and scout during the Civil War and her subsequent activism in earning the right for women to vote. Tubman's life provides thoughtprovoking lessons for today and demonstrates why she is considered a hero.

(NCAUR), will give a brief overview of Peoria's "Ag Lab," its current mission, and research programs. Each week we'll meet a different scientist who'll share the details of their research. Jim Kenar will teach us about aerogels (frozen smoke) – solid, highly porous ultralight materials composed of up to 99% air by volume. We'll learn about their unique and interesting properties, uses, and current research on biobased aerogels. Will Hay will share the contributions of Norman Borlaug, an American agronomist who led initiatives worldwide that contributed to the extensive increases in agricultural production termed the "Green Revolution." Mark Berhow will discuss how the search for new functional foods, environmentally friendly pest control, biofuels, and biodegradable consumer products and packaging is the ongoing challenge to 21st century agriculture research.

We will examine nearly all of his operas through video and audio excerpts with the leading singers of the past 50 years. While enjoying many of his "greatest hits," we will analyze moments of greatness from less well-known operas. As we survey these great works, expect brief Italian lessons as we learn key vocabulary terms essential to the plots. Puccini led an exciting life, pursuing three great passions: fast cars, fast women, and cigarettes. One of those killed him. Can you guess which?

26. Students Learning to Think like Engineers: FIRST Tech Challenge in Peoria Public Schools

FIRST Tech Challenge is way more than building robots - students learn to think like engineers. Teams of 7th-12th graders design, build, code, and operate robots to compete in a head-to-head challenge against other teams each February. Hosea Washington, a FIRST Tech Challenge mentor, along with students, will share the details of the program, past experiences, and their plans for the upcoming competition. The Peoria Women's Club is regarded as the mother club of the social and cultural life of Peoria. Join us for an in-depth look at the historic \$4 million restoration efforts currently underway at the second oldest women's club in the country in continuous use of its original building (and the only one with a theater). Peoria's venue was built in 1893 by architect William Le Baron Jenney, who rose to fame after building the very first skyscraper in 1884. PWC board members will serve as our guides as we learn about club history, restoration, and current and future programming plans.



PARKING FOR CLASSES

We offer a "park-and-ride" option so you can park in large lots near campus and enjoy drop—off service at the front door of the Michel Student Center. Information will be mailed with your class schedule.

If you choose to park at Shea Stadium, located near the Ag Lab at the corner of University and Nebraska avenues, a Peoria Charter Coach will transport you to and from campus. If you park at Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1420 W. Moss Avenue, the OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus.

Volunteer parking coordinators are located at both sites to assist you with your parking needs.

Because OLLI provides park-and-ride service, OLLI members are not allowed to park anywhere on campus (including the Visitor's Lot) or in Campustown. If you park in these areas and receive a ticket, you will not be eligible for an appeal and will be required to pay the fine.

CLASS PARKING PERMITS

For our members taking classes who have state—issued handicapped placards or license plates AND are physically unable to utilize our door—to—door shuttle service from Shea Stadium and Westminster Church, we have a very limited supply of handicapped—accessible parking permits for use during classes. At a cost of \$10 each, these permits allow you to park in a handicapped or white—lined space on campus for all four class dates. All requests must be made via telephone to (309) 677-3900 three weeks prior to the first day of in-person classes. When you call, please be prepared to provide your license plate number, your placard number and expiration date, and the make, model, year, and color of your vehicle.
