Springfield, Illinois Tuesday, September 19

Join us for a day in Springfield, home of the Illinois governor. We'll tour the Executive mansion which is the third-oldest, continuously occupied Governor's home in the nation. Seven U.S. presidents, including Lincoln, have been received there. Three levels will be toured including four formal parlors; a state dining room; ballroom; four bedrooms, including the Lincoln bedroom; and a library handcrafted from native American Black Walnut.

From the mansion, we'll tour the Illinois State Library building at 300 S. Second Street and enjoy lunch at Arturo's. After lunch we'll view the "Illinois Amish Quilt Collection-World Premiere" in the Illinois State Museum. Over 100 of the finest Amish quilts in existence today will be displayed. The museum is also home to one of the world's largest Ice Age mastodons and an amazing collection of Illinois' natural and cultural treasures. A state-of-the-art, computer-interactive exhibit, "At Home in the Heartland," offers visitors the opportunity to take part in real-life scenarios of Illinois residents from the 1700s through the 1970s.
