### **Peoria County Sheriff's Department** Wednesday, February 23

Join us for a behind-the-scenes look at the Peoria County Sheriff's Office, located on Maxwell Road in Peoria. The office serves a population of approximately 130,000 people in a 648-square-mile area of Central Illinois. We will tour the administrative offices, jail, kitchen, and the lab to learn how highly-qualified officers and staff members handle criminal investigations and protect Peoria County residents.

## Designer Tile and Stone by Leslie - Morton Wednesday, March 2

Watch the actual fabrication of granite tops and follow the process from the cutting to the edging, shaping, and final polishing. Tour the facility from the warehouse to the beautiful showroom filled with a vast array of ceramic tile, stone, and carpet.

## George O. Pasquel Company - Peoria Thursday, March 31

Walk through the showroom, warehouse, and the used inventory and equipment building. You will see over 10,000 items, large and small restaurant equipment, smallwares (china, crystal, glassware, silverware), paper goods, and chemicals. This family-owned business has been supplying restaurants, hospitals, nursing homes, and the general public since 1946.

## **Metamora Courthouse** Thursday, April 7

Closed for renovation since 2002, the Metamora Courthouse is once again open to visitors. Built in 1845, the courthouse is one of the area's richest historical sites. President Abraham Lincoln, Vice-President Adlai E. Stevenson, and Supreme Court Justice David Davis are among the famous people who practiced law in Metamora. We will visit the main floor museum and the second floor courtroom. To view the courtroom, visitors must climb a flight of stairs.

## **Prairie Woods Farm - Morton** Thursday, May 5

Prairie Woods Farm started as an outgrowth of a love for both native plants and gardening. Eight years ago it was difficult to find many native plants, so Carol and Jack Gittinger began growing their own. Today they grow about 150 flowers and grasses, starting them from seeds and cuttings. Visitors will see developing plants from seedlings through mature plants of 2-3 years old and learn about the propagation and care processes. Prairie Woods Farm, a specialty nursery with customers all over the state, is the only native plants nursery of its size in the Tri-County area.

## Jacqueline Kennedy: The White House Years **Field Museum** Chicago, Illinois Wednesday, March 23

Join us for a fascinating docent-led tour of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis items from the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum. The exhibit includes more than 70 articles of clothing and personal items worn by the First Lady at her husband's inauguration and other events. We will also see classic and rarely-seen photographs, Mrs. Kennedy's handwritten notes, and much more from her White House years. In keeping with the White House theme, we'll enjoy a beautiful "White House Years" lunch box with an assortment of tea sandwiches. We'll also have some free time to explore other areas of the Field Museum.

## House of Blues, Outsider Art Tour Chicago, Illinois Sunday, April 17

Pixie Jacquin's Fall ILR class on outsider art generated much interest, so we're off to a wellknown Chicago center of outsider art, the House of Blues. At the House of Blues, we'll enjoy the famous noon Gospel Brunch, which features southern-style cooking, omelet and waffle stations, and a wide variety of breakfast and lunch items...plus great musical entertainment. Following lunch, Pixie Jacquin will guide our understanding of the unique artwork that fills the walls of the House of Blues. Next, we'll travel to The Oriental Institute Museum, a showcase of the history, art, and archaeology of the ancient Near East. An integral part of the University of Chicago's Oriental Institute, which has supported research and archaeological excavation in the Near East since 1919, the Museum exhibits major collections of antiquities from Egypt, Mesopotamia, Iran, Syria, Palestine, and Anatolia.

Note: This trip is subject to cancellation if we do not have sufficient registration. While the price is outside our normal range for one-day excursions, the cost of the special Sunday Gospel Brunch and entertainment necessitates the increase for this trip.

## Hornbaker Gardens and Mid-American Growers **Princeton, Illinois** Thursday, May 19

Join us for a behind-the-scenes tour of two wellknown gardening businesses. In the morning we will learn how Hornbaker Gardens, "The Princeton Perennial People," obtains and propagates new

varieties of hosta, how they work with their famous irises and daylilies, and how to get the most out of a water garden. After a buffet lunch at Hunter's Ridge, we'll visit Mid-American Growers, where we will learn about this 53-acre nursery and view their large selection of spring annuals and over one million hanging baskets. Mid-American ships their plants to locations up to 300 miles away and to familiar retail outlets, such as Wal-Mart, Home Depot, Lowe's, and K-Mart. Wear your walking shoes for the day and enjoy the outdoors with us.

## Millennium Park Chicago, Illinois Thursday, June 2

Join us for a tour of Millennium Park, Chicago's newest attraction at the Northwest corner of Grant Park. Upon arrival in Chicago, we will go to the Park Grill at Millennium Park for a lovely private dining room lunch. The highly-rated Park Grill restaurant features American cuisine. After lunch, we'll experience a two-hour docent tour of Millennium Park's architecture and sculpture. Works by internationally renowned designers converge around architect Frank Gehry's centerpieces: the Jay Pritzker Music Pavilion, with its unique trellis, and a winding, sculptural pedestrian bridge--Gehry's first. In the Lurie Garden, the world's largest contemporary art garden, Kathryn Gustafson's highly symbolic landscape architecture tells of Chicago's "big shoulders," its rise from the swamp, the Great Fire, and its outstanding architecture. Anish Kapoor's 66-foot-long, 110-ton reflective stainless steel sculpture and Jaume Plensa's 50-foot-tall, high-tech Crown Fountain prove how engaging

cutting-edge, architectural public art can be. Don't miss this one!

## Museum of Art, Lilly House, Eiteljorg Museum, Indiana State Museum, and Benjamin Harrison House

### Indianapolis, Indiana Thursday, June 9 - Friday, June 10

Upon arrival, we'll go to the Garden Terrace Restaurant to enjoy a special gourmet lunch prepared by the catering service of renowned chef Wolfgang Puck. Next, tour the Indianapolis Museum of Art and the historic 22-room Lilly House, recently designated as a National Historic Landmark. After a brief walk through the magnificent gardens, we'll check into the hotel to enjoy dinner on our own and a free evening to explore downtown. A hot breakfast buffet starts Friday morning and we'll tour the historic home of President Benjamin Harrison and the Indiana State Museum. Lunch will be at the Indiana State Museum cafeteria. Our last stop will be the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art. The museum has recently added 45,000 square feet to house new exhibits, and we will be among the first people to visit as it reopens. After a docent-led tour and some time to explore on your own, we'll board the bus to return home.
