

As you pass through the photo gallery highlighting the destruction of Parsons from the F4 tornado July 13, 2004 and the rebuild process that followed, you will enter the new 280,000 square foot facility. You will witness up close the process of creating steel parts from raw sheet metal to finished parts such as fenders, fuel tanks, platforms, and undercarriage frames. Institute of Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation (IPMR) Tuesday, March 21 Cost \$20

IPMR was founded in 1950 in response to the polio epidemics and the need to get veterans back to work. Dr. Harold Vonachen of Caterpillar, along with Bill and Bob Rutherford of the Forrest Park Foundation, envisioned a state-of-the-art rehabilitation program for people of all ages. Today, IPMR remains a non-profit comprehensive medical rehabilitation center and provides inpatient and/or outpatient therapy at 18 locations throughout Central Illinois. IPMR Return to Work Center has the area's largest program of injury-prevention training, ergonomic assessments, physical testing for the workplace, and work conditioning programs.



Caterpillar Demonstration and **Application Center** Wednesday, March 29

Visit the Caterpillar experience at the Edwards Demonstration and Application Center. This facility offers a General Line Product Demonstration which represents each product family in a single demo. Some examples of the machines are skid-steer loaders, small and large excavators, back hoe loaders, track-type tractors, articulated trucks, off-highway trucks, telehandlers, large wheel loaders, and motor graders. There are two main demonstration sites outdoors and two indoors, one with three-fourths acre under roof and the newest arena with two acres under roof.



Linden Hill Farms Thursday, April 27

Cost \$20

Linden Hill Farms is a fourth-generation dairy farm located in the rolling river valley west of Peoria. While milking 170 Holstein and Brown Swiss cows, they also grow enough crops to feed the herd and to market cash crops. We'll watch the morning milking process and learn how milk travels from the farm to our homes. In addition, the family has begun a manure recycling business by way of composting. Linden Hill Farms and Better Earth Compost are home to the Rosenbohm families of Fred, Paul, and their mother, Anna Lee. After our tour we'll eat at Kim's Kitchen in Bellevue.

Conner Nursery and Kickapoo Creek Winery Wednesday, May 3

Conner Nursery and Gardens has been in business since 1995 selling about 500 different varieties of hosta as well as many ornamental grasses, perennials, and annuals. Kickapoo Creek Winery is adjacent to Conner Nursery in Edwards, Illinois. The name was taken from nearby Kickapoo Creek and the Native American tribe that lived in this area. The soil is less than ideal for corn, but it's good for the 65 varieties of grapes. Walk the rows, examine and compare the grapes, and learn about the various vines.

Bob Emser Studio Wednesday, May 10

Cost \$20

Join Bob Emser, sculptor, on a tour of his Eureka studio. The 2000+ square foot studio with 20-foot ceiling allows for the creation of Emser's large-scale public sculpture. The studio was designed by the artist and was built in 2002. In addition to the studio, the 1.5-acre compound has landscaped areas that highlight several pieces of Bob's large outdoor sculpture.

Girodet: Romantic Rebel

Art Institute of Chicago Wednesday, February 15

Join us for a trip to the Art Institute of Chicago to view works of the celebrated French artist Anne-Louis Girodet de Roussy-Trioson (1767 – 1824). The exhibit contains more than 100 works that demonstrate the artist's range of work. Girodet's career was shaped by the dramatic social and political upheaval brought about by the French Revolution. A pupil of Jacques-Louis David, Girodet developed his own personal style, a fusion of Neoclassicism and Romanticism.
