The Bradley University Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) is a group of over 600 learners, age 50 and over, who learn together through three distinct programs.

Three times each year, we meet at Bradley and enjoy presentations by volunteers who teach four 1-hour sessions on a subject of their choice. OLLI Classes cover all topics and disciplines and regularly include a few hands-on computer classes.

We also take Learning Trips, held throughout the year and throughout the region. With a focus on learning, we enjoy behind-the-scenes explanations, step-on guides, and docent-led tours that enrich each of our excursions. Transportation is provided, and lunch is generally included on these half day and full day trips.

Study Groups are another feature of OLLI. These member-facilitated groups convene around a topic of mutual interest and include discussions and presentations by the group's members. Study groups generally meet two hours for five or six weeks and convene throughout the year.

In essence, OLLI is our opportunity, at 50 and over, to learn again. It's an organization that enables us to revisit old interests and develop new ones; to rekindle old friendships and make new ones—with people like ourselves. It's our time to learn!

Welcome to our 2009 Spring session of OLLI (Osher Lifelong Learning Institute). Our move to a new name – OLLI, accompanied by a \$100,000, grant has enabled current program enhancements and several very exciting program possibilities in the future.

Additional personnel (a secretary and a program director) have already been hired in the Continuing Education Department to work with the OLLI program.

As a result of the increased support our overall program offerings, classes, trips, and study groups will be increased for the spring session. Planning is currently underway for adding new activities in the future.

For the 2009 Spring session the curriculum committee, under the leadership of Gil Nolde, has increased the number of classes to 54 which is a significant increase over the 45 classes offered Spring 2008.

Our uppermost appreciative thanks go to Peggy Cornelius who has retired from curriculum chair after many years. Peggy was a very dedicated curriculum chair and instrumental in seeing that the classes offered were varied, interesting, and educational. Please give Peggy a big thank you when you see her.

Trips have become very popular and most fill up early leaving many on the waiting lists. Popularity and subsequent demand for the trips has improved as a result of very positive reviews by those who have made trips in the past. Therefore trips have been increased in number for the Spring session – six additional trips have been added to the program. You'll also notice that trips are now first in the brochure–so you can find them quickly.

Study groups were introduced in the Fall 2008 session to see how our group would respond and, based on the very positive feedback, our study group selections have also been increased.

Changes have also been made to the Executive Board to support future programs. Four members have been added to sit on the board, namely Chair of Curriculum, Chair of Winterim, Chair of Study Groups, and Chair of Learning Trips.

We will continue to utilize the Westminster Presbyterian Church lot on Moss Avenue and the lot at Shea Stadium (formerly Meinen Field) on Nebraska. Shuttle service will be provided to the front door of the Student Center and will make return trips throughout the day.

The future of OLLI is very exciting. Enjoy our Spring OLLI program.

New for Spring – activity level descriptions for each trip! In order to assist in trip selection, we have included an activity level icon next to each trip description. Some of this year's trips provide opportunities for you to learn while exploring, hiking, and more. Please take care to note the level of activity for each trip, illustrated below:



Participants should be able to climb a few stairs, stand for up to an hour, get on/off van or bus with minimal assistance, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.





Participants should be able to climb a few flights of stairs, walk on uneven surfaces from three blocks up to two miles over the course of a day.







Participants should be in good health, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of physical activity per day (the equivalent of walking up to five miles at a 2.5-mph pace over uneven ground).









Participants must be in excellent health, extremely mobile, and used to an active lifestyle. Activities may require up to six hours of strenuous, moderate- to fast-paced activity per day (the equivalent to hiking six miles at a 3-mph pace over varied terrain).



Join us as we tour two of the businesses located in Pekin's Riverway Business Park, Winpak Heat Seal Packaging and Excalibur Seasonings. Peoria County Sheriff's Office 12 Thursday, February 26, 2009

Back by popular demand, this behind-the-scenes look at the Peoria County Sheriff's Department will be led by Peoria County Sheriff Mike McCoy. We will tour the Sheriff's administrative offices and crime lab to learn how highly qualified officers handle criminal investigations and protect Peoria County residents. During our trip through the lockup portion of the building, we'll experience the jail's new technological advances, including a closed-circuit video bonding system, digital computer driven mug shot system, computerized booking system, and live scan fingerprint process system.



Toraason Glass Thursday, March 12, 2009

Experience the beautiful art of glass blowing at a working artist's 2,700 square foot studio and gallery in downtown Peoria. Glass artist Hiram Toraason, who has displayed his finished work at OLLI and is scheduled to teach a "Look What I Did" course in April, will lead a tour of his gallery and demonstrate the techniques of working with 2,000-degree molten glass to create a one-of-a-kind work of art. Tour members will also be able to purchase individual pieces, all of which are signed and dated. Cameras and camcorders are welcome.

Caterpillar Robotics/Technical Center Thursday, March 19, 2009

Caterpillar conducts major product research at its Technical Center, a sprawling campus-like facility in Mossville. Join us as we get a behind-the-scenes look at Cat's virtual reality development, robotics, and related technology. We will also learn about the various associated technologies and the applications to future products. This tour requires close-toed shoes and the ability to enter/exit the vans frequently.

Great Harvest Bread Company Tuesday, March 24, 2009

Ever wonder what it is like to be a baker? Join us as we find out during a tour of the Great Harvest Bread Company on North Allen Road. We'll have the bakery all to ourselves while we discover the five simple ingredients the company uses to make its bread, see how wheat kernels are ground into fresh flour, follow the baking process from the milling room to the mixers, and more. We will also be able to personally bake a half-loaf of honey whole wheat bread and sample it fresh out of the oven.

Dynamic Controls Inc. Thursday, March 26, 2009

Lighting, heating, and cooling our homes is something most of us take for granted. For Bill Wahl, ('65) president of Dynamic Controls, Inc., however, it's something he thinks about every single day. Bill will give us a behind-the-scenes look at Dynamic Controls, Inc., a company that manufactures, supplies, and installs automated and integrated building control systems, including heating, air conditioning, and high-tech security systems. We'll get a look at how the company monitors its clients' facilities via online systems, and hear about how his company installed the security camera system at Illini Stadium when the Chicago Bears played at the University of Illinois during Soldier Field renovations.

A Day in Downtown Dunlap Land Thursday, April 16, 2009

Need a break from your daily routine? Spend a relaxing day in Downtown Dunlap, where we'll tour several locally owned businesses and enjoy a civilized high tea and lunch, English style. First, we'll take a guided tour of the Little Church on the Prairie Wedding Chapel, a small, private chapel that caters to brides and grooms on their special day. Next, we'll enjoy high tea and lunch at Her Majesty's English Tea Room, where owners Jerry and Jackie Gillam will guide us through their unique shop, give a presentation about the formalities of high tea, and compare notes with those of us who participated in the high tea service in London in 2007. Lastly, we'll meet the owners of two small downtown businesses, Knit 4 Together (a yarn shop owned by four local women) and the Village Clock Shop, Arts & Antiques (owned by John Parks, Sr.) as they talk about the histories of their shops. Note special time: 9:45 a.m. - 2:30 p.m.



Historic Washington Square Friday, May 15, 2009

Historic Washington Square will be the focus of our learning as we visit the thriving city of Washington, Illinois. Located just five miles east of the Illinois River, the city of 13,000 has grown into a progressive community while preserving its rich heritage. Our visit will include a tour of the Village Doctor Museum, where we'll step inside a doctor's office just as it was in the early 1900s. We'll also tour the adjacent Zinser House, which was mail-ordered from the Sears Catalog. After a walking tour of the churches, homes, and businesses on the square, we'll have lunch at the Denhart Baking Company & Restaurant. Owners Tom and Judy Gross will show us around their building, discuss its recent restoration, and explain their efforts to have it listed on the National Register of Historic Places. After the tour is complete, participants are welcome to spend an hour enjoying the square on their own.

182nd Airlift Wing, Illinois Air National Guard Land Tuesday, June 23, 2009

Day in and day out, C-130 Hercules cargo aircraft leave Peoria destined for locations all over the world. Whether delivering humanitarian supplies to Hurricane Katrina victims or air dropping food and ammunition in the middle of the night to our Special Operations Forces engaged throughout Afghanistan in the Global War on Terror, the citizen-airmen of the 182nd Airlift Wing, Peoria Air National Guard, are always proudly representing the Heart of Illinois. During this trip, we will have a chance to see some of these professionals in action as we tour the maintenance, operations, and security facilities. Colonel William Robertson ('83), the Wing Commander, will also provide an aircraft tour and present a short briefing about the 182nd Airlift Wing's missions involving the global war on terror, humanitarian support, and homeland security missions. Due to security regulations, all participants will be required to show photo identification prior to entering the base.

Becoming Edvard Munch: Influence, Anxiety, and Myth Art Institute of Chicago, Illinois Tuesday, February 24, 2009

In the first regional trip of the year, we will have the opportunity to view the work of Edvard Munch, whose work, including the canonical 1895 The Scream, has been connected to his emotional pain and supposed insanity. Participants will be excited to learn that we will be accompanied to the Art Institute of Chicago by Bradley University art professor Heather Brammeier and 10 of her students. After we view the exhibition, Ms. Brammeier will give a short talk about Munch and his impact on modern art.

This rich exhibition will bring together approximately 150 works, including 75 paintings and 75 works on paper by Munch and his contemporaries rarely seen in the United States. The works will be organized around the following themes: the street and crowd; anxiety and solitude; love and sexuality; nature, bathing, and the

neo-romantic landscape; and, finally, death and dying. This arrangement will serve to reinforce the connections between Munch's art and that of his peers in often surprising ways.

Cost: \$109, which includes round-trip charter bus transportation (during which we'll view a DVD on Munch), admission to the museum and special exhibits, audio tour, and lunch. Please register by Wednesday, February 4.

Chicago Gangster Tour Downtown Chicago, Illinois Wednesday, March 4

In this first-of-its-kind trip, we will travel to Chicago to learn about the city as it existed during the Roaring Twenties, when the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages was outlawed and strictly prohibited. We'll have a personalized step-on tour guide, "Big Julie," who'll give us the inside story on Chicago's windiest politicians, rollicking red-light districts, and most notorious vice games. We'll see the old gangster hot spots (and hit spots), hear of the exploits of Capone, Moran, and Dillinger, feel the excitement of jazz-age Chicago during the era of Prohibition, and enjoy a journey into the past as we cruise the city in search of the old hoodlum haunts, brothels, gambling dens, and sites of gangland shootouts!

After we drop off "Big Julie," we'll head to Tommy Guns Garage, Chicago's only speakeasy dinner theater, for lunch and a show. We'll enter through the rear entrance under the tracks, provide a secret password, and be transported into the 1920s, complete with gangsters and flappers, silent movies, a 1928 Ford Model A car, and a replica of the St. Valentine's Day Wall.

The audience interactive show offers a musical comedy revue with the gangsters, flappers (and us) dancing and singing musical selections from Cole Porter, George Gershwin, Duke Ellington, and more. For your meal, you'll choose from "King Pin" prime rib, "Big Jim" lasagna, and "Don't Call Me Chicken" chicken breast; plus soup or salad, vegetable, potato, dessert, and coffee, tea, or soft drink. Hooch (alcohol) will be available, but must be purchased on your own.

Cost: \$124, which includes round-trip charter bus transportation, two-hour gangster tour, lunch and show at Tommy Gun's Garage, and snacks on the bus. Please register by Wednesday, February 18.

A Day in Flanagan & Gridley Flanagan and Gridley, Illinois Thursday, April 23, 2009


Plan to spend the day with us as we explore several interesting venues in Flanagan and Gridley, Illinois.

The Flanagan AquaRanch practices "aquaponics," a form of agriculture that combines aquaculture (raising fish in a controlled environment) and hydroponics (growing vegetables and herbs in water). Aquaponics results in two primary products: naturally-raised tilapia fish and organic basil. We'll learn about the life cycle of the fish and the herbs from inception to market.

Salem Children's Home, also located in Flanagan, opened in 1896 as an orphanage for boys and girls. Through the years, it has evolved into a boarding school for troubled young boys ages 12-18. With about 50 horses on the campus, the young men learn how to ride and take care of the horses, and Salem's annual horse auction is its major fund-raiser.

After a stop for lunch at the Green Garden Restaurant, we'll visit the Gridley Telephone Museum, a local fixture since 2002. The museum's telephone collection houses phones dating back to the late 1800s, including a model that Alexander Graham Bell introduced at the Philadelphia Exposition.

Cost: \$69, which includes round-trip charter bus transportation, lunch, and tours of all three facilities. Please register by Thursday, April 2.





Amish Countryside Tour Arcola, Tuscola, and Arthur, Illinois Thursday, May 7, 2009


Immerse yourself in the Amish culture for the entire day to get a glimpse of what it would be like to live in a different world when we visit Amish country in Arcola, Tuscola, and Arthur, Illinois.

Our day will begin with a visit to the Illinois Amish Interpretive Center museum, where we'll view an 18-minute introductory video about the Amish, see the Smithsonian Institution's traveling exhibit "Between Fences," and enjoy the other permanent exhibits, including Anabaptist history, Amish history, buggies, quilting, barns, homes, and technology.

After the museum tour, we'll pick up a step-on guide and head into the countryside to see significant homes, schools, farms, and businesses along the way. During the countryside tour, we'll stop at Wilson's Kitchens and More to see craftsmen making furniture.

We will then head to the home of Delores Graber, who will host our group for a homemade lunch of fried chicken, homemade bread, hearty sides, all the fixin's, and, most importantly, homemade pies! After the meal, we will take an Amish woodworking shop tour and then head to Flesor's Candy Kitchen for a personalized candy-making demonstration. Cameras are welcome at all venues except lunch.

Cost: \$89, which includes round-trip charter bus transportation, museum admission, step-on guide for countryside tour, lunch with an Amish family, woodworking shop tour, and candy-making demonstration. Please register by Thursday, April 9.



Peoria Area Historical Barn Lunch-n-Learn Bradley University and Rural Peoria County Thursday, May 14 and 21

Have you ever driven through the countryside and wondered why some barns are noticeably different than others? In this repeat of our successful program, we'll once again have an opportunity to learn the fascinating history of barns and farm structures throughout rural Peoria County.

First, on May 14, Bob Sherman, a Springfield resident and barn expert with degrees in history and museum management, will present a morning class about the history of American barns and farmstead buildings. He will explain the barn's European antecedents by showing their ethnic origins and characteristics, and then we will discuss and examine the nomenclature and the functional uses of farm structures. The presentation will be a total of two hours, followed by lunch in the Alumni Dining Room in the Bradley Student Center.

Next, on May 21, we'll board the bus and venture out into the countryside for a day-long visit to different types of barns in our area. We will be looking at rural structures and farmsteads in and around the Peoria area, observing the different characteristics discussed in the lecture.

Cost: \$89, which includes the lecture, round-trip bus transportation to the barns, lunch on both days, and refreshments. Please register by Thursday, April 30.

A Day in Princeton Princeton, Illinois Tuesday, May 19, 2009

Our day of learning will begin at the Bureau County Historical Society Museum, which consists of two adjacent buildings: the Clark-Norris Home, a handsome Prairie Square mansion built in 1900, and the Newell-Bryant House, a stately Greek revival house dating back to 1853. Among the exhibits are an 1853 parlor, an interpretation of Princeton photographer Henry Immke's studio (including many of his negatives and photographs), a large costume room, and a research library. Other items on display are fossils, Native American artifacts, pioneer utensils, farming equipment, Civil War and military memorabilia, Cherry Mine Disaster displays, early vehicles, and medical equipment.

After touring the museum, we'll head to the Lovejoy Homestead, home of the Denham and Lovejoy families for nearly 100 years. Reverend Lovejoy was its most famous resident and occupied the house from 1838 until his death in 1864. Lovejoy was prominent in the abolition movement and the Underground Railroad, a founder of the Illinois and national Republican Party, and a Congressional leader. He is perhaps best known for his role in the Underground Railroad. As an outspoken abolitionist, he openly proclaimed his willingness to assist fugitive slaves. His involvement made this house one of the most important stations on the Underground Railroad in Illinois. The United States Secretary of the Interior declared the property a National Historic Landmark in 1997.

After lunch at The Lightpost Restaurant, we'll visit some downtown shops (including Patterns of the Past), then conclude the day with a visit to Hornbaker Gardens, a family-owned and operated nursery specializing in perennial flowers. Large collections of hostas, daylilies, irises, and other perennials draw plant enthusiasts from all over the Midwest to this nursery. Our visit should coincide with the full blooming of the irises!

Cost: \$69, which includes round-trip charter bus transportation, all site admissions, and lunch. Please register by Wednesday, April 22.

Behind-the-Scenes at Wildlife Prairie State Park 18 Wednesday, June 10, 2009

Be a part of OLLI's first hiking trip when we experience an exclusive behind-the-scenes look at Wildlife Prairie State Park, a 2,000-acre zoological park just outside Peoria.

Our day will begin with an hour-long guided hike along the park's numerous walking trails and animal exhibits. During the hike we will learn about the native plant and animal species, the bison and elk pasture, and the Sandhill Cranes in Walden Pond.

Next, we'll enjoy an informative birds of prey exhibition followed by a personalized, behind-the-scenes look at the educational animals used at the park. The park's staff will show us how they feed and care for the animals, explain how they rehabilitate injured birds, and provide opportunities to see individual animal enclosures. Afterward, you'll have two hours to enjoy a gourmet boxed lunch and explore more areas of the park.

Cost: \$49, which includes round-trip van transportation, admission to the park, guided hike with bottled water, birds of prey presentation, behind-the-scenes tour, and lunch. Please register by Wednesday, May 13.

Intergenerational Day at Camp Big Sky 15 Tuesday, June 16, 2009

It's another OLLI first – a day of outdoor adventure with an intergenerational twist. Celebrate the end of the school year with a full day of hiking, boating, and fishing ... with your grandkids! Participants on this trip have the option of bringing a grandchild (or other family member) aged 8 – 12 as we spend a beautiful summer day at Camp Big Sky, a charitable, not-for-profit campground near Farmington that provides accessible fishing, camping, boating, and other related outdoor opportunities to children and adults with disabilities.

As highlighted in the Fall 2008 edition of Hilltopics, Camp Big Sky was founded by Brad Guidi ('71), who was inspired to make a difference in the lives of people with disabilities following the death of his younger brother Bruce, who had severe developmental disabilities. Guidi and his wife, Willa ('72) are parents to 26-year-old Dominique, who is confined to a wheelchair with cerebral palsy and developmental disabilities. In 1995, his family purchased a 102-acre tract of strip mine land near Farmington, and Guidi decided to create a place where people with disabilities could access the outdoors that so many of us take for granted.

Guidi will lead us on a tour of the campground, cabins, fishing pier, pavilion, and a hike along wheelchair-accessible

nature trails. We'll also take a pontoon boat ride on Bruce's Lake, a 15-acre, half-mile-wide body of water that features a 230-foot-long floating dock. After enjoying a catered box lunch in one of the outdoor pavilions, you'll have time to spend the remainder of the day fishing off the dock, playing bocce ball, flying kites, or enjoying the scenic views throughout the 102-acre site. All fishing supplies, sports equipment, and binoculars will be provided.

Cost: \$69 (adults) / \$29 (kids ages 8-12), which includes round-trip charter bus transportation, guided hiking tour, boat ride, fishing/recreation equipment, water/snacks, and lunch. Please register by Wednesday, May 20.

Starved Rock Geology Hike Friday, June 19, 2009

Experience the fun of outdoor adventure as we enjoy an all-day geological hike around Starved Rock State Park with Ed Stermer, assistant professor of earth science at Illinois Central College.

Our first stop will be at Buffalo Rock State Park, located on a bluff which was once an island in the Illinois River. Buffalo Rock was the home of the Illinois Indians before the tribe was virtually annihilated in protracted warfare with the aggressive Iroquois. Now standing majestically on the north bank, this 280-acre promontory affords a magnificent sweeping view of the Illinois River. While exploring, we will learn about the geologic history and mineral resources of the region.

We'll then head to the Starved Rock Lock and Dam and Visitors' Center, meet with the Army Corps of Engineers, and tour their facility. After a relaxing lunch at the Starved Rock Lodge Restaurant, we'll hike trails within Starved Rock to visit and discuss the 18 canyons that slice dramatically through tree-covered, sandstone bluffs. In addition, we'll view and learn more about the park's rock formations, primarily St. Peter Sandstone, the historic site of the siege, starvation, and demise of the entire Illini tribe.


Our final stop will be a hike through Matthiessen State Park, where we will explore the beautiful rock formations, learn about the canyons, streams, prairie, and forest, and view one of the largest waterfalls in Illinois.

During the first group meeting, the instructors will give an overview of important contributions made by Chicago jazz musicians/educators. Some example topics include the following: 1) Review Jelly's Blues: The Life, Music, and Redemption of Jelly Roll Morton by Howard Reich and William Gaines and published by Da Capo Press, 2004, 2) Understand Louis Armstrong's time spent in Chicago, possibly reading Jazzmen by Frederic Ramsey and Charles Edward Smith and published by Harper & Row Publishers, 1985, 3) Create a discography and listen to recordings made by the Austin High Gang, including Jimmy McPartland, 4) Study the influence of Captain Walter Dyett at DuSable High School (Johnny Hartman, Dorothy Donegan, and many great tenor sax players), 5) Understand the great tenor saxophone tradition and listen to its styles (Gene Ammons, Johnny Griffin, Von Freeman, etc.), 6) Understand the contributions of the Sun Ra Arkestra, 7) Understand the contributions of the Art Ensemble of Chicago, 8) Discuss Chess Records and listen to their jazz recordings, 9) Investigate the crossover and relationships between jazz and blues musicians, 10) Understand the lives and contributions of current legends, Earma Thompson and Erwin Helfer, and 11) Conduct phone interviews with Earma and Erwin, and ask them to share some of their stories.

Students will learn about the history of Chicago Jazz by talking about and listening to a number of historic jazz players and educators from Chicago, including Captain Dyett, Dorothy Donegan, Gene Ammons, Johnny Hartman, Sun Ra, Clifford Jordon, William Russell, and more. We will also learn about the lives and careers of a few living jazz legends from Chicago.


