LEARNING TRIPS

What could be better than a travel adventure that takes you off-the-beaten-path and behind-the-scenes? Better still – how much more fun would it be if someone else made all the arrangements for you?

Now you have a sense of what it's like to join an OLLI Learning Trip. We like to travel, but our purpose is to investigate and explore our destinations. So you can expect that a local expert will be on the trip, or at the site, who can explain the significance of what we see and do. On the road, we have fun too whether it's a scenic pull-off, snack stop, or movie on the bus. Our goal is to provide a door-to-door experience in travel learning.

Participation in Learning Trips is worry-free. All travel arrangements are made by staff in Continuing Education, parking for your car is reserved during the trips, and most fees are included in the price. To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- Times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.
 - Many of our Learning Trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments. To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on our trips.
 - Each Learning Trip includes an activity level symbol. Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.
- (1) Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
 - (2) Level I, plus: climb some flights of stairs and walk on uneven surfaces.
 - (3) Levels I & II, plus: healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity.
 - (4) Levels I - III, plus: able to participate in 6 hours of daily moderate activity.

LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, van/shuttle transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 20 and fill quickly.

Heartland Festival Orchestra (Activity Level I) Saturday, January 11, 5:30 – 10:00 p.m.

The Heartland Festival Orchestra is composed of the finest professional musicians Central Illinois has to offer. During this concert, performed at Five Points Washington, we'll enjoy a performance of Vienna to Broadway III, a musical journey from Old Vienna to New York. We will also participate in an exclusive question-and-answer session with Conductor David Commanday and some members of his orchestra prior to our dinner, which will be held before the performance in a room adjacent to the theatre. \$65 – includes catered dinner, pre-show lecture, and tickets to performance. Transportation not provided – meet us at Five Points Washington!

Advanced Medical Transport (Activity Level I) Monday, January 13, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Join us for a tour of Advanced Medical Transport (AMT), a private, not-for-profit company that serves the people of more than 30 communities throughout Central Illinois. We will learn about the state-of-the-art equipment that dispatches the ambulances, get a close-up look inside an ambulance, and tour one of the most high-tech classrooms in the area. We'll also find out how AMT's nurses, paramedics, emergency medical technicians, and dispatchers provide medical services to fire protection districts, townships, municipalities, counties, hospitals, and more. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Toraason Glass (Activity Level 1)**Monday, January 20, 11:30 a.m. – 2:45 p.m.**

One of OLLI's most intriguing local favorites is back by popular demand! For those who haven't yet experienced this trip, please join us as we get an exclusive, up-close look at local artist Hiram Toraason's 4,000-square-foot glass-blowing studio and gallery. Hiram, a graduate of Southern Illinois University who apprenticed under William and Katherine Berstein in Celo, North Carolina, will demonstrate his techniques of working with 2,000-degree molten glass and create a one-of-a-kind work of art. Hiram will also discuss the artwork he created for Caterpillar Inc., for the renovated entrance to UnityPoint-Methodist Medical Center, and for a newly renovated downtown nightspot.

Powerton Generating Station (Activity Level 2)**Tuesday, January 21, 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.**

Join us as we experience a behind-the-scenes look at the Powerton Generating Station, a coal-fired power station owned and operated by Edison International, a subsidiary of Midwest Generation, located just southwest of Pekin. During our visit, we'll learn all about the coal-fired boilers that produce enough electricity to meet the needs of 1.8 million households. The station, which, along with Powerton Lake, occupies over 2,000 acres, was opened in 1928 by Commonwealth Edison. During the tour, we'll also learn how the electricity generated by the station is transmitted for distribution to commercial, retail, and industrial customers, and meet some of the staff who work at the station.

WEEK-TV 25 Studios (Activity Level 1)**Wednesday, January 22, 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.**

WEEK-TV, the NBC-affiliated television station in Peoria, began broadcasting to Central Illinois in 1953. On this popular trip, we'll take a private tour of the studios on Springfield Road in East Peoria, learn how news is gathered by various professionals in the newsroom, view editing bays and the control room, and have an opportunity to see reporters and anchors at work. In addition, our tour will include a behind-the-scenes viewing of the midday news broadcast and a question-and-answer session to learn more about the station, which also operates the ABC and CW affiliate, WHOI 19. Depending on the broadcast schedule, we may also have a chance to talk about local news reporting with midday anchors Garry Moore and Sandy Gallant.

IPMR (Activity Level 1)**Thursday, January 30, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.**

The Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation (IPMR) is a non-profit comprehensive medical rehabilitation center dedicated to improving patient physical function and quality of life. Founded in 1950, IPMR provides inpatient and outpatient therapy at 18 locations throughout Central Illinois. During our tour of the Sheridan Road facility, we will learn about fall prevention, acupuncture treatment, and concussions, plus get an opportunity to try out the balance master and return to work equipment. IPMR staff will also provide a detailed look at the wellness center, Parkinson's group programs, Senior World activities, and the driving evaluation and counseling program.

UICOMP (Activity Level 1)**Friday, January 31, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.**

Once located in Bradley University's Burgess Hall, the University of Illinois College of Medicine at Peoria (UICOMP) has graduated more than 1,400 physicians since 1973. UICOMP is one of four campuses that make up one of the largest public medical schools in the United States, offering a balance of classroom education and clinical experience. During our visit, we'll learn how the school aims to improve healthcare in our community through education, research, and patient care. While on campus, we'll also visit the labs within the Cancer Research Center, where surgeon scientists and researchers are making discoveries aimed at improving patient care and finding a cure.

Komatsu (Activity Level 3)

Monday, February 3, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Komatsu America is the second-largest manufacturer and supplier of construction equipment in North America. The company manufactures and markets a full line of integrated construction equipment from the smallest compact construction size to the largest mining size, including hydraulic excavators, off-highway trucks, and motor graders. The Peoria facility, is part of the company's network of 12 plants in North America dedicated to the manufacture, marketing, financing, and distribution of equipment and parts. Join us as we visit the Peoria facility and see a large truck frame welded from start to finish, walk through the assembly line of the Engine Power Module, and visit the main assembly line of Komatsu's large mining trucks.

Jump Trading Simulation and Education Center (Activity Level 2)

Tuesday, February 4, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

In 2011, a Chicago-based trading company donated \$25 million to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center and the University of Illinois College of Medicine at Peoria (UICOMP). The result of that gift is the Jump Trading Simulation and Education Center, a virtual care delivery setting that replicates patient care with actual medical equipment and state-of-the-art simulation devices that provide the highest level of medical research, training, and innovation to attract the finest minds in clinical education.

As a follow-up to our January 2013 hardhat tour, we'll see the finished anatomical training and innovation labs, the virtual reality and skills lab, virtual intensive care units, the virtual operating theater, and more.

General Wayne A. Downing

Peoria International Airport (Activity Level 2)

Thursday, February 6, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Back by popular demand – an exclusive, behind-the-scenes look at the General Wayne A. Downing Peoria International Airport with Director Gene Olson. On this tour, we'll see areas of the airport not normally accessible to the average passenger, including ticket counters, inbound baggage facilities, passenger screening rooms, waiting areas, and jet bridges. We will also learn how the new 125,000 square-foot terminal conveniently places ticket counters, baggage claim and rental car desks on one floor in the main concourse, serving around 1 million travelers annually through 12 gates. In addition, there will be an opportunity for questions and one-on-one interaction with airport staff.

Homeway Homes Factory and Model Homes (Activity Level 2)

Wednesday, February 12, 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

If you've ever wondered about the modular homes on display off Interstate 74 near Goodfield, this is the perfect opportunity to learn how they're designed and built. On this popular trip offered each Winter, we'll travel to Deer Creek to tour the Homeway Homes Factory and learn all about the company's modern design and construction processes. We'll see the staff at work throughout each step of the building stages, including floor and wall build, roof set, plumbing and insulation, siding, and final inspection and wrap. After the factory tour, we'll head to Goodfield to tour several completed model homes, then enjoy lunch at the locally owned and operated Busy Corner Restaurant. \$25 – includes lunch, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Menold Construction and Restoration (Activity Level 2)

Tuesday, February 18, 8:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Menold Construction and Restoration is a multifaceted, award-winning restoration contractor. Participants will tour Menold's state-of-the-art restoration and construction facility in Morton, talk with the management team, and view the construction area where in-house painting and staining is performed. We'll also see Menold's restoration division, which includes a massive inventory of equipment used for water, fire, storm, and mold emergencies. We

will also walk through the Ozone Room, where content is cleaned and smoke residue is removed.

Maui Jim (Activity Level 1)

Thursday, February 20, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Now the fastest growing premium polarized sunglass maker in the world, Maui Jim got its start in the 1980s as a one-man business on the beach in Lahaina, Hawaii. During this trip, we'll tour the company's headquarters in Peoria and see first-hand how it engineers its PolarizedPlus lenses, which combat the sun's intense glare and harmful UV rays. We'll get a close-up look at the lab and see employees at work throughout the facility. In addition, Maui Jim staff members will discuss the company's "Aloha Spirit" philosophy, its move from Hawaii to Peoria, and discuss how the company's "ohana" (Hawaiian for family) has steadily built a cult following for its products.

Historic Metamora (Activity Level 1)

Friday, February 21, 9:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

On this trip, we'll visit the small Woodford County town of Metamora and get a close-up look at two historical sites. First, we'll tour the Illinois Mennonite Heritage Center, which features a museum of personal, household, school, and congregational items; a restored Sutter Barn; woodworking tools and machinery; and a restored Grandfather House. The Center also includes archives and a research library of the Illinois Mennonite Historical and Genealogical Society. After lunch, we'll take a private tour of the Metamora Courthouse State Historic Site, best known for being one of only two surviving courthouses on the 8th Circuit where Abraham Lincoln handled more than seventy cases - including two two harboring slaves cases.

Pat Sullivan's Le Vieux Carre (Activity Level 1)

Tuesday, February 25, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Pat Sullivan, Peoria native, entrepreneur, and co-developer of the city's warehouse district, will be our host as we tour a complex of downtown buildings that have been revitalized in recent years. Participants will get a private, behind-the-scenes look at the Le Vieux Carre ("small quarters") building on Water Street, a former buggy and implement warehouse built in the 1800s which was also rumored to have once housed Al Capone's whiskey stills and gambling devices. Pat may also give us a look at the redeveloped Sealtest building (which now consists of offices and condominiums), and discuss his efforts to create a new urban neighborhood in Peoria's warehouse district, recently awarded \$10 million in federal grants.

Peoria County Coroner's Office (Activity Level 1)

Thursday, February 27, 11:30 a.m. – 3:45 p.m.

Our visits to the Peoria County Coroner's Office have proven to be some of our most intriguing Learning Trips. On this day, we'll learn about the responsibilities of Peoria County Coroner Johnna Ingersoll, an elected official charged with investigating sudden, unusual, and traumatic deaths and assuring those bodies are examined, identified, and if necessary, autopsied. Since her election in 2004, Johnna has been responsible for overseeing investigations of more than 2,000 deaths annually. Our visit is expected to include an observation of a jury inquest, held to determine the manner of some deaths in Peoria County. In addition, if it is not being used during our visit, we'll also have an opportunity to see the on-site autopsy room and morgue.

REGIONAL TRIPS

Spend time with OLLI enjoying travel throughout Illinois and nearby states. Winter Waterfall Hike & Eagle Watching (Activity Level 4)

Thursday, January 16, 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Join Professor Ed Stermer and members of the Illinois Audubon Society as we take a hiking, geology, and eagle watching trip to Starved Rock State Park in Utica. Stermer, a professor of earth science at Illinois Central College, will guide us along the trails within Starved Rock and discuss the 18 canyons that slice dramatically through tree-covered, sandstone bluffs. In addition, we'll view the park's incredible rock formations and waterfalls while learning about the amazing geologic history and mineral sources of the region. Depending on the conditions, we will hike through several canyons and marvel at the beauty of the frozen waterfalls. Members of the Illinois Audubon Society have been asked to join us to provide insight about the birds of prey we may view soaring above the river that afternoon. Please note that this trip will include hiking on trails that, depending on the weather, may be snowy and/or slick. Participants must review the activity level suggestions prior to registering.

Wildlife Prairie Park: A “Jewel of the Midwest” – Journey and Strategy for the Future **Thursday, January 16**

Wildlife Prairie Park opened to the public in 1978 – 35 years ago. Today, this unique 1800-acre wildlife refuge hosts 140,000 visitors and educates more than 50,000 children and young adults each year. In 2000, the park was deeded to the state of Illinois and became a state park. On May 11, 2013, Governor Pat Quinn signed legislation that transferred Wildlife Prairie Park back to private ownership. Bill Cirone is the President of the Board of the Friends of Wildlife Prairie Park and President of Federal Companies, a 100-year-old company that is one of the largest privately-owned moving, storage, and logistics companies in the country. Bill will briefly describe the history of the Wildlife Prairie Park (starting with Bill Rutherford’s vision), the journey to return the park to private ownership from state ownership, the business focus of the Friends of Wildlife Prairie Park, and the strategic plan to ensure the success of Wildlife Prairie Park far into the future.

Six Stories by Flannery O'Connor

Be brave as we tackle six challenging stories by the late Southern writer, Flannery O'Connor. Her work has been described as comic, bizarre, grotesque, and violent as well as brilliant, spiritual, and transcendent. O'Connor once said her work wouldn't be understood for 100 years, but we'll give it a try. Participants are expected to read selections from the 1972 National Book Award winner, *Flannery O'Connor: The Complete Stories*, available in paperback, electronically, or from area libraries, concentrating on "A Good Man is Hard to Find" for the first week and "Good Country People," "Revelation," "Parker's Back," "Everything That Rises Must Converge," and "The Displaced Person" in subsequent weeks. We will also take "a good hard look" at O'Connor's brief life and the literary criticism that swirls around her work.

This Study Group condenses and combines previous information from both the iPad Basics and iPad Intermediate Study Groups. In this history-oriented Study Group, we will: 1) learn about promoters who drew millions of Midwesterners to LA, 2) research real people and places of the time, 3) create a “notorious locations” map of LA, and 4) compile a casebook of dreamers, chisellers, swamis, crooked cops, and bitter fools. Internet access is required for research. Participants should obtain a copy of *A Bright and Guilty Place* by Richard Rayner (paper or e-book). Helpful but not required: watch a few movies set in 1920-1950 Los Angeles, such as *Chinatown* (1974); *There Will Be Blood* (2007); *The Changeling* (2008); *Bound for Glory* (1976); *The Big Sleep* (1946); *Murder, My Sweet* (1944); *The Lady in the Lake* (1947); *Zoot Suit* (1981); *LA Confidential* (1997); *The Black Dahlia* (2006); *Gangster Squad* (2013). Listen

for recurring ideas and attitudes. Participants will read 60 pages per week for the first four weeks. Using our book as a starting point, small groups will choose people and places for research, find photos and additional information online, and write notes for captions in our casebook. Volunteers will assemble and edit the casebook (a Word document). Progress will be shared weekly, however there will not be any formal presentations.




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
