WHAT IS OLLI ONLINE?

OLLI is an acronym for The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Bradley University, an organization of more than 1,200 Peoria area residents who are at least 50 years old and who want to stay vital and active as they reach and enjoy retirement. One of the best ways to do that is to keep learning, and OLLI offers many options to do so.

OLLI Online provides many virtual learning experiences delivered via Zoom, a free and easy to use video conferencing software. Meeting “live” via Zoom allows learning to continue from the comfort and safety of our own homes until we can meet in person again. Please review our current program options so you can pick what best fits your learning preferences and interests:

- **Introduction to Zoom** sessions help our members learn how to use the software on their computers, tablets, or smart phones. Led by a volunteer OLLI instructor and offered free of charge to all, our goal is to help you feel comfortable with the technology so you’ll enjoy your experience with OLLI Online.
- **OLLI Virtual Classes** are lecture-based courses during which the instructor delivers the learning material with the opportunity for participants to ask questions either during or after the presentation. OLLI Virtual Classes have been offered since May and continue in October; they meet at 9:00 a.m., 11:00 a.m., 1:00 p.m., and 3:00 p.m. for one hour each.

- **OLLI Virtual Study Groups** are participation-based; the facilitator delivers core learning material, but all participants learn by sharing. OLLI Virtual Study Groups usually have an expectation of reading, watching a video, or other independent study outside of each session. Each group starts at various times throughout each month, and usually meet for 1.5 hours to 2 hours for four to six weeks. Seats are usually limited to 15 to 25 participants so that everyone has an opportunity to actively participate.
- **OLLI Virtual Learning Trips** to restaurants and area attractions are opportunities to get behind-the-scenes looks at local businesses. Some include a curbside meal pick-up, followed by a virtual presentation by the chef / owner the next day.
- **OLLI Virtual Originals** are exclusive talks with local leaders and businesses from the community and beyond. These one-hour sessions are a great way to keep informed about specific topics, governmental updates, or business organizations.
- **OLLI Virtual Happy Hour** is a free social time hosted by an OLLI volunteer twice a month. Each happy hour has a theme, but it’s not necessary to share – just pop in and enjoy!

VIRTUAL CLASSES

1. The Seeds of a New Nation: English Colonization of North America 9:00 a.m.

English Pilgrims landed in Plymouth 400 years ago, planting the seed of the second permanent English colony in North America. Over the next 100 years, more seeds of English settlements would be established, eventually forming 13 colonies. In this class we will learn why English settlers came to North America, discuss some of the difficulties they experienced in getting here, explore the hardships they faced in settling lands already occupied by others, and find out how these seeds of colonies grew and eventually prospered. We will primarily focus on Jamestown Colony in Virginia, and Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay Colonies in Massachusetts.

2. What is Autoethnography? 9:00 a.m.

Autoethnography is a method of writing and doing research that uses personal experience (“auto”) to describe and interpret (“graphy”) cultural texts, experiences, beliefs, and practices (“ethno”). Autoethnographers believe personal experience is infused with cultural norms and expectations, and they engage in self-reflection in order to identify and interrogate the meanings of, and intersections between, the self and social life. In this interactive workshop, we will discuss key characteristics and practices of autoethnography. Specifically, we will discuss what autoethnography is, how it developed, how it is best used; how to begin doing autoethnography; how to write autoethnograph; and ways you can use/do autoethnography in your life.

3. Mythology Through Art: Every Picture Tells a Story

Artists from ancient to modern times have used Greek and Roman mythology as the theme for their art. This class will take a look at some of these masterpieces and discuss the myths behind them, and how the artists chose to depict them. If you love art and have always wondered about the stories, or you love mythology and want to hear the stories again, then this class is for you!

4. Social Media, Big Tech, and You

11:00 a.m.


This class expands on Cory Barker’s Fall 2019 class, Media Literacy in the Age of Social Media and Fake News. The impact of tech companies like Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, and Google goes far beyond news production and consumption. This class will address their increasing influence over our everyday lives – from data collection and privacy to entertainment and shopping. It will also introduce participants to emergent platforms like Netflix and TikTok that have significance on a global scale. Participants will learn how to use these platforms smartly and why they matter to the future of pop culture and society.

5. Healthcare 2020 What Now?

1:00 p.m.

In this election year, health care and health reform are major issues for a majority of citizens. The recent pandemic, socio-economic disparities among segments of the population, and protests concerning racial discrimination have exposed important weaknesses in our system. Questions of system change are part of the national discussion as the election nears. The U.S Healthcare system now consumes over 18% of GDP, and clearly

affects every citizen. The class will discuss the status of the current delivery system, including lessons learned during the pandemic, and rationale for reform, problems with access to the current system and reasons for the high cost of healthcare. We will also look at “Medicare for all” vs. repair and revision of the current system, and have a discussion of comparative systems used in other developed countries. Can we devise a system which provides optimal care to all Americans at an affordable cost?

**6. Use and Misuse of Statistics
1:00 p.m.**

Research Statistics are a valuable tool to help us make informed decisions in our daily life. Statistics are gathered by universities, corporations, and all levels of government to advance knowledge and provide a basis for a vast amount of government spending. Those statistics can be very useful if done right. However, statistics can also be used to misinform us, and we need to know how to be cautious about interpreting the data. This class will focus on how to become healthy skeptics of statistics, learn more about surveys and polling, especially in this political season. We will discuss a selection of the massive amount of government collected data, focusing on life expectancy, the census, unemployment, and others. Lastly, we will wrap it all up by discussing how good statistics can be used to explain things the way we want them.

**7. Health and the Media
3:00 p.m.**

In this class, we’ll discuss the field of health communication research, theory, and practice. With a focus on both organizational structures within the healthcare landscape and the role of mass media in defining health and wellness, with various contexts to analyze health communication. Media portrayals of illnesses and disorders across traditional and new media will be discussed, as well as the resulting effects these portrayals have on the audience.

Tom Boylan grew up in Princeville and participated in Future Farmers of America. A year after graduation, he enlisted in the Navy and spent four years in service to our country. During that time, he decided to become a deep-sea diver and eventually achieved Navy Diver First Class rank. In this role, he was involved in many types of challenging underwater tasks, including construction, search & rescue, repair, and demolition. Join us to hear his story!

October 21 - Mother Nature's Partner...A 20-Year Journey to Restore Land and Water

Bud Grieves was mayor of Peoria beginning in 1997. After leaving office and while mushroom hunting, he found a peaceful spot for his future home on a bluff. Twenty years later, he has restored the native trees, prairie grasses, and wetlands to a former cornfield. He also developed a unique water management system on his 400-acre property that keeps siltation out of the Illinois River. This was an incredible learning journey. Join us for the inside story of Indian Ridge.

Inspiration started with the house with the garden... the amazing garden. This led to gardening, which led to writing, which led to art and illustrations... a learning journey that was self-taught. But oh, the places the journey has led to! Jan Powers writing and gardens have been featured in the Peoria Journal Star and magazines such as Midwest Living, Victorian Homes, and more. 1. Travel with OLLI to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio

Join OLLI for a live, interactive, docent-led journey to the Pro Football Hall of Fame for “The Story of Pro Football.” We will examine the museum concept brought to life through the use of priceless artifacts and historical documents, which illustrates the museum approach of conveying the history of professional football through these objects. The program includes a discussion about why the Hall of Fame is located in Canton, Ohio, which is based on Northeast Ohio’s historic ties to professional football.

2. Travel with OLLI to the Dalai Lama Center for Ethics The Venerable Tenzin Priyadarshi *Running Toward Mystery: The Adventure of an Unconventional Life*

Join OLLI for an exclusive conversation via Zoom with the Venerable Tenzin Priyadarshi, a Buddhist monk from India ordained and mentored by the Dalai Lama. Priyadarshi is an innovative thinker, philosopher, educator and a polymath monk. He is President & CEO of The Dalai Lama Center for Ethics and Transformative Values at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, a center dedicated to inquiry, dialogue, and education on the ethical and humane dimensions of life. Venerable Tenzin’s unusual background encompasses entering a Buddhist monastery at the age of ten and receiving graduate education at Harvard University with degrees ranging from Philosophy to Physics to International Relations. He is the recipient of several recognitions and awards, and received Harvard’s Distinguished Alumni Honors for his visionary contributions to humanity. In

2020, Priyadarshi released his book “*Running Toward Mystery: The Adventure of an Unconventional Life*” a profound account of his lifelong journey as a seeker.

3. Travel with OLLI to the Illinois State Museum “Fashioning Illinois: 1820-1900”

Join Erika Holst, Curator of History, on a walk through the Fashioning Illinois exhibition to explore 19th century clothing and the impact of textiles on early American life. It is hard to overstate the role of textiles during this period. For families, the making of clothing required countless hours of labor, while the purchase of textiles could consume a large portion of the household budget. For the nation, textiles drove the pre-Civil War American economy. We’ll see stunning examples of historic costumes, textiles, and accessories from the museum’s Illinois Legacy Collection.

4. Travel with OLLI to the New York Historical Society Museum “The Eighth Wonder of the World: The Brooklyn Bridge”

Discover how the bridge’s construction helped lead to the consolidation of New York and how old world engineering know-how and modern industrial innovation came together to complete the project.

As part of the COVID relief package, Illinois’ Small Business Development Centers have received an additional \$7.3 million in funding to help them guide businesses through the pandemic crisis – with no charge to the businesses. Williams Distilling moved to the north side of Peoria in September to their new primary production facility, and will start construction of their retail space in the Warehouse District in late fall. J.K. Williams has harvested a number of barrels and will be bottling around 4,000 bottles of 4+ year bourbon and 1,200 bottles of 4+ year rye whiskey for sale on local shelves. Have you been watching the construction on the Murray Baker and McClugage Bridges? Join OLLI as we get an update on the construction from IDOT Construction Field Engineer Nick Volt. Construction on the Murray Baker Bridge has remained on schedule for its planned October reopening date. The eastbound portion of the McClugage Bridge was completed in 1948 following World War II and is approaching the end of its serviceable life. The new eastbound bridge is under construction now.


Dr. Rustin Gates from the Department of History will present “‘Why, you are no different from us!’: Japanese American Resettlement in Peoria During World War II.” The War Relocation Authority (WRA) helped establish connections for incarcerated Japanese Americans. Eventually, over 25,000 Japanese Americans relocated to the Midwest during the war, with nearly half moving to Illinois. While the bulk of the resettlers went to the Chicago area, some also moved to Peoria—lured by new jobs or the opportunity to study at St. Francis Hospital (OSF) or Bradley University. Learn about the contributions these individuals and families made to Central Illinois.

7. Heritage Restoration and Design

Heritage Restoration and Design Studio is an historic restoration and preservation company. For six consecutive generations, the owning family has operated as restorers. Using a mixture of Old World techniques and American ingenuity, Heritage’s staff repairs and restores stained glass, woodwork, oil paintings, and historic interiors. 1. Constitutional Quarrels

Do you know about the “sick chicken” case? How about the case of the miscreant purveyor of scandal? In this study group, we will learn the backstory behind some of the groundbreaking decisions from the nation’s highest court and meet a fascinating cast of characters whose passions, proclivities, and personalities drove the decisions that made America the country it is today. We will discuss how these opinions affect us and whether they were a positive or negative influence on our development as a nation. We will read chapters from the book for each session. Participants must acquire *Quarrels That Have Shaped the Constitution*, edited by John A. Garraty, available at local and online retailers and libraries.

An amazing amount has survived to this day. If you are interested in learning how they built their roads, planned their cities and supplied them with water, join us for this Great Courses based study group. Internet access for video viewing and independent research is required, with approximately 1.5 to 2 hours outside work per session.


