Imagine learning only about the topics you choose, taught by engaging instructors, on a college campus, with people your age, and no tests or grades. Add time for socializing, and you have a sense of what we do. It's learning - our way!

1. Drawing Through Observation

Learning to draw requires a strong foundation in observation. In this introductory level class, you will develop your observation skills and learn the fundamentals of drawing. As you learn to sketch and render, you will begin to discover your own style. Pencils and paper are all you will need to get started. A list of supplies will be provided before the first class. Class instructor is Janet Keturi, a practicing studio artist and instructor with a background in illustration/design and fine art. She is a graduate of the American Academy of Art in Chicago and the College of Fine Art at Illinois State University. (NI/NC)

2. Introductory Meditation for Spiritual Awareness

Meditation helps reduce stress, increases productivity, and improves concentration. More importantly, it helps us grow spiritually. We will cover the physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual benefits of meditation, developing the meditation technique, sitting quietly and focusing, and stilling the mind. A \$5 workbook fee will be collected on the first day of class by the instructors: Mary Kay Berjohn, a retired school psychologist; Harold Berjohn, a retired school administrator; Prem Bhatia, a retired family practice physician; and Suraj Bhatia, a retired mechanical engineer at Caterpillar. 3. A Penny for Your Thoughts: The Brain and Learning

Learning, as any OLLI member can tell you, is a lifelong endeavor. Think about it: learning begins in the womb, and although it accelerates at different times across the life course, learning continues through every age. All of us develop to learn around the clock. We owe our ability to learn to our brains; one of the most complicated and advanced computers on Earth. This course describes how our brains learn by describing the processes that allow us to store, retrieve, and make use of vast quantities of information. We will focus on types of learning and memory, how different states impact our ability to learn, and we'll end with techniques to optimize learning. The class instructor is Marjorie Getz, professor of arts and sciences at Methodist College. (RI/NC)

9:00 - 10:00 a.m.

4. Auctions - It's Not Rocket Science

In this class, Joe Orwig, owner of Orwig Auction and Appraisal Service, will teach participants about the different types of auctions. We will look at auctions from the perspectives of both the buyer and seller, including how and when to make bids. In addition, Joe will look at trends in the auction industry and what is hot right now. If so desired, participants can also learn the basics of bid calling and catching bids. Class participation is encouraged! (RI/RC)

5. Financial Planning Basics for All

In this class, we will look at some of the basic financial planning issues we should all be considering, especially in retirement. While there is no such thing as a "one size fits all" financial plan, information in this class should help you define your own needs and teach you how to achieve them. The basics of budgeting, investments, taxes, and estate planning will also be reviewed. Class instructor is Christopher Franklin, financial consultant with Midwestern Securities in East Peoria. (NI/NC)

6. Five Ws of Insurance

Join the discussion about how insurance needs change throughout the various stages of life. We will review who needs insurance and when it's needed. Do you have a family? Do you rent or own your home, vehicle, or your business space? Are you eligible for Medicare or need a Medicare Supplement? What happens when your healthcare coverage changes? We will also discuss auto, home, health, life, disability, and long-term care coverage, and where and when you can compare coverages. Finally, we will talk about how insurance (or the absence of it) affects you, your family, and your budget. Class instructor is Teresa Hagen, an insurance broker, consultant, and agency owner. (NI/NC)

7. Ian Fleming: The Man Behind James Bond

We will study the personal and professional life of Ian Fleming, the author who created super spy James Bond. Participants will learn about Fleming’s wealthy upbringing, his destructive lifestyle, his military career in MI-6, and his literary creation of one of the most recognizable names in pop culture, James Bond. Class instructor is Chuck Collins, member of the Ian Fleming Foundation. (RI/RC)

8. The Making of a Saint

The Catholic Church names new saints through beatification and canonization. Saints are held up as examples of heroic virtue to be imitated and to serve as intercessors who pray for us. This class will examine the historical development of the canonization of saints and the process used today. We will also review the steps in the process that take place before the proposed saint is recommended to the Pope for canonization. Class instructor is Msgr. Jason Gray, pastor of St. Thomas Parish in Peoria Heights, who spent three years working as an official in the Congregation of the Causes of Saints at the Vatican. (NI/NC)

9. The People and Practice of Medicine

Dr. Julius Bonello, Peoria surgeon and medical historian, will lead an intriguing and entertaining class about the many interesting people, procedures, and incredible facts related to the historical practice of medicine. He will take us on a journey from past practices that have evolved to the modern medical profession we have today. (RI/RC)

10. Photos from Mild to Wild: Photography Basics and the Creative World of Post Processing

This class will focus on what to look for in a photograph, composition techniques, and the effects of camera settings, then explore the world of post processing from minor enhancements to radically changing your image. We will be introduced to the basic tools of Photoshop, too. Laptops and iPads are welcome. Class instructor is Coke Mattingly, OLLI volunteer and photographer. (RI/NC)

11. Prune, Don't Dig: You May Never Again Look at a Tree in the Same Way!

Every gardener makes decisions for the next generation when pruning a tree. Today’s pruning, or the failure to prune, will determine whether the tree will survive a wind storm 20, 50, or 100 years in the future. A few key pruning principles can make all the difference. This class

will include a walking tour of the Bradley campus that has many examples of exceptionally good tree pruning. John Amdall, OLLI volunteer and member of the American Conifer Society, will share what he has learned and provide a handout to help with tree pruning challenges. After taking this class, you may never again look at a tree in the same way. (RI/RC)

12. Anabaptists Then and Now

The class will look at the Anabaptist movement from the Reformation of the 16th century to the present day, with a focus on Amish and Mennonites in Illinois. Why did the movement start? What are its distinctive beliefs and practices? How have Anabaptists changed over the centuries? What challenges does the movement face today, especially in Central Illinois? An optional field trip to the Illinois Mennonite Heritage Center near Metamora on April 26 will supplement the course, but requires separate registration (see page 26). Class instructor is Michael Yoder, a retired sociology professor who lives on a hobby farm on the edge of Eureka. He is a lifelong Mennonite with Amish and Mennonite ancestry dating back to the Reformation in Switzerland. (NI/NC)

13. Energy – From the Inside Out

Rich Radochia is a new OLLI instructor, but he is not new to the topic of energy. He had a long career in constructing and maintaining a wide variety of energy-producing facilities. This class will provide a thoughtful examination of all forms and energy – in the U.S. and around the world – and a balanced perspective on the complex issues around energy production and consumption. (NI/NC)

14. Grace and Grandeur – The Story of Four Great English Churches

We will explore four of the great English churches: Durham Cathedral, York Minster, Westminster Abbey, and St. Paul’s Cathedral. You will learn about the history and the various, sometimes surprising, functions associated with each site. We’ll also compare their grand architectural features and see some of the gorgeous art, from ancient to modern, found within their walls. This class is intended for confirmed church buffs as well as those who just want to develop a greater appreciation of these amazing places. Class instructor is Roger French, a retired IT professional. (NI/NC)

15. How Artificial Intelligence Is Changing Everything

Artificial Intelligence (AI) enables everything from your Amazon recommendations to self-driving cars. Sam Kherat, past OLLI instructor and adjunct professor of mechanical engineering at Bradley, will provide the background and history of AI. This class will focus on the applications of AI, and how AI is being embraced by education, autonomous vehicles, and medicine. (RI/NC)

16. Life-Centered Financial Planning

This class will cover advanced financial planning strategies for retirees, including estate conservation and gift planning, healthcare and long-term care planning, inflation and market volatility, and tax-efficient retirement withdrawal strategies. A basic understanding of investing and taxes is recommended for participants. Class instructor is Fran McKay, CFP®, CRPC®, AAMS®, certified financial planner™. (RI/NC)

17. Lions and Tigers and Bears, Oh My!

Although in general, the economy and stock market can be a golden road leading investors to increased security and wealth, at times it can become a scary path to navigate, especially during downturns or more serious declines. Are you prepared in the event of a bear market or recession? Learn how to review your investments, with suggestions on what you probably should own before your statements shout, “I’m melting, I’m melting!” Class instructor is Carl Williams, senior vice president at Chapin Davis Investments. (RI/NC)

18. Public Libraries in the Digital Age

Public libraries today are not your parents’ libraries! Each week, we will have one or two local library directors talk to our class about the innovative programs and services offered by their libraries. Each of our area libraries is unique and we will showcase how you can access what we offer both via our websites and at our library locations. Each library will provide current newsletters and promotional materials. Featured libraries include Illinois Prairie District Library (Metamora), Joel Shoemaker, Director; Chillicothe Public Library, Mary Aylmer, Director; Peoria Public Library, Randall Yelverton, Director; and many more! Class instructor is Roberta Koscielski, Deputy Director of the Peoria Public Library. She was selected in 2018 as a *Library Journal* “Mover and Shaker.” (NI&RIs/NC)

19. Stephen Sondheim: His Life, Works, and Impact on Modern Musical Theater

In a follow-up to his class on Andrew Lloyd Webber, Stan Ransom, retired teacher and frequent OLLI instructor, will examine the prolific life of Stephen Sondheim, a leading American composer and lyricist for over 50 years. Sondheim, who has been involved in an astonishing

collection of great works ranging from *West Side Story* through *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum* and *A Little Night Music* to *Into The Woods*, is a protégé of the great Oscar Hammerstein II, and has written the lyrics or music or both for over 20 shows. With video clips, we will survey many of his shows, and take a deeper look into a couple of his most significant and individualistic musicals. (RI/NC)

20. A Study of Shepherd of the Hills

In 2017, the iconic American novel, *Shepherd of the Hills*, by Harold Bell Wright celebrated its 110th anniversary. At one time, the novel claimed the distinction of being the most widely-read book of fiction in American publishing history. Wright spent eight summers living in the Ozark Mountains just west of Branson, Missouri to recover from tuberculosis. The book’s success sparked the beginning of a tourist boom in the Branson area; the novel was even made into a movie starring John Wayne. Class members should read the novel, available online and at local retailers and libraries, prior to the first class. During the class, we will discuss the characters, plots, and sub-plots. Class instructor is Mark Johnson, Caterpillar retiree. (RI/NC)

21. Truth or Legend: The Superheroes Who Shaped the Character of Ancient Rome

This class will explore the famous Roman men and women whom the Romans considered their national heroes. Using the writings of the ancient authors Vergil, Livy, and Plutarch, we will learn their stories and see how the Romans looked to these heroes as examples of courage and patriotism, and how these compare to our own ideals. Class instructor is Janene Mattingly, past OLLI secretary, retired Latin teacher at East Peoria Community High School, and avid Italy traveler. (RI/NC)

22. Working with the City of Peoria

Peoria depends on its residents to know what is going on in our community, and it has established lines of communication to get information back to the residents. These mechanisms, however, can be complicated and confusing, and may even obfuscate the information attempting to be conveyed. This class should help clarify how to get information about city issues and how to give effective input regarding city activities. A panel discussion will also be presented on the last day to discuss ways to remain a well-informed and empowered resident. Class instructors are Beth Ball, Peoria City Clerk; Ross Black, director of Peoria’s Planning and Zoning Department; Sgt. Tony Rummans of the Peoria Police Department; and Nick Vlahos, reporter for the *Peoria Journal Star*. (N/RIs/NC)

23. Art of the Book: Bookbinding

In this class, we'll learn several basic techniques for softcover bookbinding to create unique, handmade books. Participants will create several books using different binding styles and paper selections. These handcrafted books can then be used as sketchbooks, diaries, travel journals, or as a special place to gather your thoughts. Class instructor is Kimberly Mitchell, Bradley University assistant professor in residence, graphic design. **NOTE: class will be held on campus at Heuser Art Center; shuttle transportation provided.** (NI/NC)

24. Isaiah: Prophet of Exiles

It may surprise you to know that the Old Testament Book of Isaiah was actually written by at least three men named Isaiah, and that they wrote during a span of hundreds of years. One Isaiah lived before the exile to Babylon, one of them lived during the exile, and the third returned from Babylon to Jerusalem, finishing up the book. We will explore all these Isaiahs, including the history, the book contents, and the messages of each of these prophets, not only for the people they were writing for, but also for the people who read them today. Class instructor is Bill Dohle, pastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Peoria. (RI/RC)

25. Let's Do a Show! The Anatomy and Physiology of a Theatrical Production

We will examine the process of presenting a theatrical production, from script selection to opening night, with a focus on amateur theatre. Class instructor is Rebekah Bourland, a lifelong Peorian who has been involved in local theatre since 1953, writing, performing, and directing productions at Corn Stock, Peoria Players, and Illinois Central College. (NI/NC)

26. Literary Lions

April 3 – F. Scott Fitzgerald

F. Scott Fitzgerald, now widely regarded as one of the greatest American writers of the 20th century, received little critical acclaim in his lifetime. He did achieve fame and (occasionally) fortune while writing about and personifying the Jazz Age. In this class, we will examine the life and legend of Fitzgerald and his wife, Zelda, and analyze his stories and novels. Why has his prose, so graceful and elegant, survived and thrived almost eighty years after his death? What was the reason he and Zelda lived such self-destructive lifestyles? What was behind his sometimes fractious relationship with Hemingway? We can explore these questions and more in our hour together. Class instructor is Gary Nelson, a retired attorney and chair of the OLLI Study Group committee.

April 10 – Laura Ingalls Wilder

There are very few people who haven't heard of Laura Ingalls Wilder or *Little House on the Prairie*. Thanks to her books and the television show that followed, we have been able to get a glimpse into the life of pioneers. In reality, Laura's story begins long before she was even born. Where did her family come from and what prompted them to move from a little house in the woods of Wisconsin into the uncharted frontier of South Dakota? Learn the true story of Laura and her family as we compare the books and television series with what really happened in their lives. We'll also discover the ups and downs, triumphs and tragedies of this beloved family. Class instructor is Kim Mullins, professionally licensed genealogist and owner of The Joyful Genealogist.

April 17 – Geraldine Brooks

Australian author Geraldine Brooks has repeatedly proven herself to be a master of the English language. From the real lives of the veiled women in the Middle East to imagined characters in war-torn Sarajevo, plague-stricken England, or Civil War-era America, Pulitzer Prize winning Brooks creates vivid and memorable prose. Class instructor is Nancy Krigbaum, a retired teacher.

April 24 – O. Henry

High school dropout, lost love, jailbird, and one of the wittiest American storytellers to ever live, O. Henry wrote short stories that catch the reader in the first lines, then again with sharp twists near the end. Learn more about his life and some of his stories that are true works of art. Class instructor is Jennifer Bass, retired teacher, OLLI past president, and frequent class instructor. (RIs/NCs)

27. Live Big Bands and Dixieland

The class will present live Big Band and Dixieland music performances, along with background information about the music and composers. The first session will feature a live program by the Peoria Jazz All Stars, directed by Scott Baldwin. The All Stars are an auditioned all-city big band of dedicated students from the three public high schools: Manual, Peoria High, and Richwoods, plus students from Notre Dame. The second session will feature a live big band program with the Bradley Groove Project, directed by Dr. Todd Kelly, professor of trumpet and director of jazz ensembles at Bradley University. The third session will include a live program by the Bradley Jazz Ensemble, a big band directed by Dr. Todd Kelly. The fourth class will feature a performance by the Peoria Pops Dixieland Band, led by Heather Maughan. (RI/RC)

28. Look Where I Went

This class was conceived on the presumption that many OLLI members love to travel, plan to do so, and/or want to hear about others' adventures and photographs. These presentations will educate all of us who have a love for lifelong learning and travel – the OLLI way.

April 3 – Iceland Roots

Join Daryl Dagit as he recounts his travels around Iceland, his discovery of his ancestral roots, and the history and culture of the island.

April 10 – Cuba's Culture

Terry Galvin Matthews will discuss the bridge between cultures with a brief history of the island, the people, artists, workers, farming, education, healthcare, and religion.

April 17 – North to Alaska

Tourist by day, a ship dance host by night, Michael Hinchman will take us on a cruise, traveling from Vancouver, British Columbia, up the Canadian coast to Alaska's Inside Passage. Our ports of call will include Ketchikan, Sitka, Skagway, Juneau, and Anchorage as we learn of his daytime excursions and nightly on-board dancing.

April 24 – Escape to Barbados

Barbados is famous for being more British than England. Escape with Edith Barnard as she shares her stories from living on this Caribbean island for 11 years. During her time there, she taught theater and music to the locals, and brushed elbows with the rich and famous. Discover the difference between visiting a tropical island and actual island living as "Edie" shares her adventures. (NIs/NC)

29. NCAUR Research Topics

After successful OLLI Classes in 2017 and 2018, four research scientists will share the details of their work at NCAUR (commonly known as Peoria's Ag Lab). Jose Ramirez will discuss mosquitoes and microbes, from vectored human diseases to the control of mosquito populations. Daren Brown will present information on new regulatory tricks for an old fungal toxin cluster. Martha Vaughan will discuss how scientists are ensuring the safety and security of our future food supply, and Neil Price will present the history of sugars, discuss Otto Warburg, and explain the roots of cancer. (RIs/RC)

30. The Other Law of Moses

The class will uncover the economic law that is inside the Law of Moses. We will learn how well it worked and how it made ancient Israel not only the most prosperous nation on earth, per capita, but also the world's first middle class nation. We will examine ancient Israel's vacillation between compliance and non-compliance with this law and see if any of it can be applied to today's urban and industrial economic structure. The inspiration for this class is the idea that good economics and morality are very much in tune. Class instructor is John Kelly, author of *The Other Law of Moses*. (NI/NC).

31. Peoria: A World-Class Art Destination

After cave paintings, art was commissioned by wealthy people for their personal enjoyment, then art museums were endowed to bring art to the public. Now, more and more, art is everywhere in the open. Learn how the explosion of public art is making Peoria a world-class art destination. Our topics will include fairs and festivals, mural art, sculpture, architecture, and urban design. Class instructors are Shannon Cox, director of the Peoria Art Guild; Doug and Eileen Leunig, professional photographers; Lynette Steger, volunteer for Peoria's Sculpture Walk; and Mark Misselhorn, an architect with Apace Design. (NIs/RIs/NC).

32. Poof! It's Magic!

Char Gott is back to teach you magical skills! Mystify your friends, your family, and yourself with your ability to perform entertaining magical effects. We'll learn magical history and ethics while we discover the fun of the art of magic. No prior magical experience is required – find the magic you possess! Class instructor is Char Gott, a longtime member of the Society of American Magicians and the International Brotherhood of Magicians who has performed in Central Illinois since 1964. (RI/RC)



33. Those Remarkable Bradford Model T Girls

Darlene Dorgan’s father denied her request to go to college in 1930 and tried to appease her with the purchase of a car. He didn’t realize he unwittingly was putting his daughter in the driver’s seat of the car credited with changing the world: one of Henry Ford’s Model Ts. Darlene was determined to ride that wave of change. For nine summers, she led a group of single girls, mostly from Bradford, on adventurous summer vacations in her “T,” named Silver Streak, crisscrossing the continent in search of adventure, meeting the rich and famous, camping, and even sleeping in jails. The class instructor, John Butte, extensively researched the story and will provide an in depth view into the trips, the girls, and that old Model T. (RI/RC)

34. Forty Gavels: One Man’s Effort to Improve Life for Working People

Forty Gavels is the groundbreaking, three-volume biography of the American Labor Movement’s legendary leader, Reuben G. Soderstrom. As President of the Illinois State Federation of Labor and the Illinois AFL-CIO from 1930 to 1970 – receiving a gavel for every year of his leadership – Soderstrom led one of the nation’s largest labor organizations through the most challenging, exciting, and impactful events of the twentieth century. In this class, Chris M. Stevens, a reporter and the author of *Forty Gavels*, will discuss how Soderstrom used legislation and leadership to improve the life for working people. (NI/NC)

35. The Great Migration of the Monarch

For centuries, the North American monarch has been on the move, migrating annually to a special forest in Mexico for the winter. This fact has only recently been uncovered, so we’re still trying to learn why monarchs migrate and how they find their way. This class will explore all three species of monarch butterflies and the continents on which they live. We will also discuss the specific pollinator plants that monarch butterflies depend upon for both food and to rear their young. If you find a caterpillar on one of your plants, this class will teach you how to raise it to become a butterfly. 36. Green Peoria – Clean Water, Stormwater, Solid Waste/Recycling

Why do we have a Stormwater Utility (SWU)? How can you lower your SWU bill and help the environment? What is a Combined Sewer Overflow? How are your garbage, recycling, and yardwaste handled? Today, The Blend is now 11 years old, and Yvonne is working with small coffee farmers in Uganda to improve their lives. Join us as Yvonne tells the story of “Coffee + Community.”

April 17 – From Darkroom to Digital to Drones: A Photographer’s Journey

David Vernon is a commercial, portrait, and fine art photographer in Central Illinois. He began taking photos at the age of eight, and even had his own darkroom in high school. Thus began a learning journey during which he transformed from a hobbyist to a professional photographer to a successful commercial photographer of sophisticated shots that utilize drone technology. You’ll even see the flying “drone’s eye view” during his live demonstration.

April 24 – Adopting a Corporate Orphan

Tom Hoback grew up in a railroad family and has loved railroads since he was a child. When he learned that a railroad line was scheduled to be abandoned, he decided to buy it and bring it back to life. When he retired 29 years later as founder, president, and CEO of the Indiana Rail Road Company, the railroad was 500 miles and 200 employees strong. 

LEARNING TRIPS

Learning trips are educational travel experiences that enable you to interact with experts who offer behind-the-scenes looks at area businesses, regional attractions, and domestic / international destinations.

On OLLI trips, you get to investigate and explore with your peers while receiving top-notch customer service – all travel arrangements are organized by staff so you can focus on learning and fun. All land excursions travel via our comfortable, easy-access OLLI shuttles or by charter coach. All trips depart from Campustown shopping center, near Bradley University, and we provide reserved parking in the lot on trip days.

To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- All learning trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. **Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.**
- Many of our learning trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments. **To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on all our trips.**

ACTIVITY LEVELS

Each learning trip includes an activity level symbol. **Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities.** This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.

- 1 Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
- 2 Stand for over an hour, climb some flights of stairs, and walk on uneven surfaces, plus all Level 1 requirements.
- 3 Be able to stand and walk for over 2 hours with minimal chance for sitting, be active for an extended period of time, be healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity, plus all Level 1 and 2 requirements.
- 4 Be able to participate in extended walking and standing beyond normal trip expectations, be able to participate in 6 hours of moderate physical activity, plus all Level 1, 2, and 3 requirements.

LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, shuttle transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 28 and fill quickly. **Please note: all times listed are approximate and subject to change.**

ACTIVITY LEVEL 1

All trips listed in this section may require participants to enter and exit a vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.

1. J Draper Glass at Studios on Sheridan 1 Friday, March 1, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. 28 seats available

40. Spotlight on Springfield 3

Join us for a day in Springfield, where we’ll tour the Executive mansion, the third-oldest, continuously occupied Governor’s home in the nation. Three levels will be toured including: four formal parlors, a state dining room, ballroom, four bedrooms (including the Lincoln bedroom), and a library handcrafted from native American black walnut. Our next stop will be the Dana Thomas House, the best preserved and most complete of Frank Lloyd Wright’s early “Prairie” houses. The structure has changed little since its construction in 1902-04 for Springfield socialite and women’s activist Susan Lawrence Dana. More than one hundred pieces of original Wright-designed white oak furniture are still in place along with two hundred fifty art glass doors, windows, and light panels. The last stop of the day will be the Old State Capitol, a reconstruction of Illinois’ fifth statehouse, the first to be located in Springfield. The building served as the seat of state government and a center of Illinois political life from 1839 to 1876. It is here that Lincoln practiced law, served as a legislator, and gave his famed House Divided speech on slavery in 1858. Abbie Alexander, OLLI class instructor and an interpreter at the Dana Thomas House, will join us to share her insights.

Our first stop in Chicago will be to the Glessner House, a National Historic Landmark that was designed by noted American architect Henry Hobson Richardson and was completed in 1887. At the Glessner House, we’ll learn about Frances Glessner Lee (1878-1962) who was widely regarded as the mother of forensic science in the early 1940’s. The house is a monumental, fortress-like design with the site in mind, featuring massive rusticated stone blocks, round arches, and design elements derived from French and Spanish Romanesque architecture. Our next stop will be at the Historic Pullman Foundation. In 1881 George M. Pullman built the nation’s first planned industrial community with housing, parks, schools, civic spaces, commercial buildings, and industrial complex all designed to provide a pleasant working and living environment for his workers. Architect Solon S. Beman brought Pullman’s town to realization. During our tour we will learn more about the architecture of this planned community.

CLASSES

For classes, we offer a “**park-and-ride**” option so you can park in large lots near campus and enjoy drop-off service at the front door of the Michel Student Center. If you choose to park at Shea Stadium, located near the Ag Lab at the corner of University and Nebraska avenues, a Peoria Charter Coach will transport you to and from campus. If you park at Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1420 W. Moss Avenue, the OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus. Volunteer parking coordinators are located at both sites to assist you with your parking needs. **Because OLLI provides park-and-ride service, OLLI members are asked to not park anywhere on campus (including the Visitor’s Lot) or in Campustown. If you park in these areas and receive a ticket, you will not be eligible for an appeal and will be required to pay the fine.**

CLASS PARKING PERMITS

For our members taking classes who have **state-issued handicapped placards or license plates AND are physically unable to utilize our door-to-door shuttle service** from Shea Stadium and Westminster Church, we have a **very limited supply** of handicapped-accessible parking permits for use during fall classes. At a cost of \$10 each, these permits allow you to park in a handicapped or white-lined space on campus for the kick-off luncheon, all four class dates, and the registration social. **All requests must be made via telephone to Bonnie Davis at (309) 677-2523 NO LATER THAN FEBRUARY 27, 2019.** When you call, please be prepared to provide your license plate number, your placard number and expiration date, and the make, model, year, and color of your vehicle.

REGISTERING FOR OLLI – IMPORTANT INFORMATION

OLLI offers four ways to register: in person, mail, online, and telephone. Please read carefully, and choose your way to register.

There are two ways to register on Day 1, Wednesday, January 16, 2019: in person at a social and via mail.

The forms received at the social are processed by staff first, then when those are entered into our system, we process the forms received via USPS. All are processed in order of date received.

We offer the social as the first option for registration because one of the most critical aspects of our program is to maintain a sense of community as our membership grows. It is extremely important that we continue to gather as a group, provide opportunities for members to meet new friends and talk about their selections for the upcoming season, to interact personally with staff and volunteers, to have the chance to provide new programming ideas, and to pick up brochures for community distribution.

Forms mailed via USPS are numbered and bundled for processing on Day 1; many members who cannot attend in person choose to mail their registration forms as early as possible. We drop our brochures at local post offices for distribution 10 days before registration begins; we cannot guarantee a specific delivery date, however, as we pay bulk-rate postage.

- Free parking will be available on campus.

From 8:00 – 8:45 a.m., volunteers and staff will check your forms, answer questions, and discuss programming while you enjoy refreshments and meet new friends. Starting at 8:45 a.m., numbers will be called in order for processing.
- **On Day 2, Thursday, January 17, 2019 at 9:00 a.m., our staff is ready to accept registrations via telephone, (309) 677-3900, and our online system, Bradley.edu/olli.**

Keeping these options to Day 2 ensures that we provide the top-quality customer service for which we always strive.

We do not offer all four options on Day 1 in order to prioritize our socialization, provide the previously mentioned top-quality customer service, and not overwhelm our small office with walk-ins and telephone calls.

- If you are waitlisted for a program, no payment is necessary. If you use a check to pay for your registration, staff will return your check and ask for a replacement one with the new total due. If you use a credit card, we will only charge the card for the amount due.


