OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE AT BRADLEY UNIVERSITY

What incredible members, volunteers, and staff we have!

Thanks to you, our members, we have met two of the major criteria of the Osher Foundation to apply for an additional million dollar endowment. The first criterion is 1,000 plus members, which we met last year, and the second is to show financial sustainability, which we accomplished with our first and very successful fundraising effort. Your generous contributions totaled \$98,018.

The Osher Foundation has also given us an additional grant while we wait for their review of our endowment application. So how are we using these funds? Great news!

In a partial answer to waiting lists for our Learning Trips, we are exploring the purchase of additional transportation to enhance these experiences. Thanks to Wayne Goetz and his Learning Trips Committee, there are nearly 40 trips scheduled this fall – almost one every day excluding weekends and holidays!

And to broaden the selection of opportunities outside our traditional fall, winter, and spring Classes, we have hired Catherine Lawless, who is joining our exceptional staff. Her primary responsibilities will be working with volunteers, Carol May and Don Wagner, whose committees are responsible for Study Groups, the Sunday Cinema series, and the Lecture series. Another bonus from our fundraising is that Sunday Cinema will be free. I'm looking forward to seeing some classics with facilitators who share additional insights with us.

As we enter our 20th year, we have also expanded from offering only 10 Classes in the fall of 1994 to more than 55 Classes this fall. A special thanks to Bob Beckenbaugh and his Curriculum Committee for planning the course offerings and recruiting the faculty (also volunteers!). And even now the Winter Curriculum Committee, under the able leadership of Shirley Streib and Mary Ellen Krum, is finalizing our January courses.

We attribute our success to many factors – the vital support of Bradley University, the Bernard Osher Foundation for its generous gifts, our generous donors to our first fundraising effort, and to our network of more than 100 volunteers for each session, including those who help us with parking, choose our giveaways, act as hosts, plan our kick-offs, select the artists for our displays, and more! And, of course, a GREAT BIG THANKS to each of you who participate in our many programs. You are what make our learning opportunities thrive and what nurtures our collegial relationships.

LEARNING TRIPS

What could be better than a travel adventure that takes you off-the-beaten-path and behind-the-scenes? Better still – how much more fun would it be if someone else made all the arrangements for you? Now you have a sense of what it's like to join an OLLI Learning Trip. We like to travel, but our purpose is to investigate and explore our destinations. So you can expect that a local expert will be on the trip, or at the site, who can explain the significance of what we see and do. On the road, we have fun too whether it's a scenic pull-off, snack stop, or movie on the bus. Our goal is to provide a door-to-door experience in travel learning.

Participation in Learning Trips is worry-free. All travel arrangements are made by staff in Continuing Education, parking for your car is reserved during the trips, and most fees are included in the price. To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- All Learning Trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.
- Many of our Learning Trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments.
 To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on our trips.
- Each Learning Trip includes an activity level symbol.
 Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.
- (1) Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
- (2) Level I, plus: climb some flights of stairs and walk on uneven surfaces.
- (3) Levels I & II, plus: healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity.
- (4) Levels I III, plus: able to participate in 6 hours of daily moderate activity.

LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, van transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 20 and fill quickly. **Please note: all times listed are approximate and subject to change.**

Proctor Place Dining: An Insider's Look (I) Thursday, September 5, APPROX. II:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

On this trip, we'll get a closer look at the logistics involved in running the dining services program at Proctor Place, a life-care retirement community that has served the Peoria area since 1906. Dining Services Director Ron Gibson, who once headed the food service staff at Bradley University, will be our host as we tour the kitchen and meet the staff who plan meals, order food, and coordinate staffing needs to ensure the residents at Proctor Place have a wide variety of dining options available three times each day. We will also learn more about the recent renovations at Proctor, which include two new specialty cafes that offer made-to-order menu items for the residents.

Wildflower Walk (I) Friday, September 6, APPROX. 8:45 a.m. – I:00 p.m.

Explore the tallgrass prairie at Forest Park Nature Center, a unique 540-acre nature preserve that features seven miles of hiking trails through forested woodlands and prairie openings, a natural history museum and bird observation room, and a nature store. We'll have our own naturalist to guide our hike into the preserve and help us observe the species sprout, bloom, and go to seed. During the hike through the beautiful forested bluffs of the Illinois River, we'll learn many facts about the wildflowers, a colorful habitat that once covered two-thirds of Illinois. \$22 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van transportation

Toraason Glass (1) Monday, September 9, APPROX. 11:30 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

One of OLLI's most intriguing local favorites is back by popular demand! For those who haven't yet experienced this trip, please join us as we get an exclusive, up-close look at local artist Hiram Toraason's 4,000-square-foot glass-blowing studio and gallery. Hiram, a graduate of Southern Illinois University who apprenticed under William and

Katherine Berstein in Celo, North Carolina, will demonstrate his techniques of working with 2,000-degree molten glass and create a one-of-a-kind work of art. Hiram will also discuss the artwork he created for Caterpillar Inc., for the renovated entrance to UnityPoint Health-Methodist, and for a newly renovated downtown nightspot.

Menold Construction and Restoration (2) Friday, September 13, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Menold Construction and Restoration is a multifaceted, award-winning restoration contractor serving a large area of Central Illinois. On this trip, participants will tour Menold's state-of-the-art restoration and construction facility in Morton. During our visit, we will talk with the management team and view the construction area where equipment is stored and in-house painting and staining is performed. We'll also see Menold's restoration division, which includes a massive inventory of equipment used for water, fire, storm, and mold emergencies, and learn how content is stored in vaults after fires. We will also walk through the Ozone Room, where content is cleaned and smoke residue is removed.

Peoria Regional High School with Dr. Brookhart (1) Friday, September 20, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Join Dr. Gerald Brookhart, Peoria County Regional Superintendent of Schools, as we tour the Peoria Regional High School at Wildlife Prairie Park, where students are offered an alternative educational experience in a unique learning environment. During our visit, we'll learn how the school provides learning opportunities for approximately 50 students each semester in math, science, and language arts. We'll also find out how the school aims to reduce the drop-out rate by improving the students' academic performance, improving their self-concepts, and enhancing their knowledge of potential careers. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Advanced Technology Services (1) Monday, September 23, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

ATS provides managed services for factory maintenance, industrial parts services, calibration, and innovative technology solutions. The local, privately owned company, formed in 1985 as a Caterpillar Inc. spinoff, has become the recognized leader in outsourced production equipment maintenance. Join us to learn why top heavy manufacturing companies, automotive suppliers, and aerospace companies use ATS to improve equipment reliability, increase uptime, and facilitate lean manufacturing.

Dixon's Fisheries (1)

Tuesday, September 24, APPROX. 8:45 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

Take a behind-the-scenes look at Dixon's Fisheries, a locally owned Midwest producer and wholesaler of fresh fish. Founded in 1896 by John and Frank Dixon, both of whom saw great potential in the fishing industry and the natural resources of the Illinois River, the company had, by 1910, become one of the most important producers and wholesalers of fresh fish in the Midwest. In the third generation, the company became a "seafood specialist," serving restaurants, country clubs, and supermarkets throughout the Midwest. During our visit, we'll learn how Dixon's, now in its fourth generation of operation, uses modern processing methods, aqua farming, and transportation systems to continue its tradition in supplying quality seafood products to customers.

Quest Charter Academy High School (I) Wednesday, September 25, APPROX. 8:45 a.m. – I:00 p.m.

Quest Charter Academy High School is a public charter school located mere blocks from Bradley University that provides its students with a curriculum rich in math, science, and technology. During this trip, meet the administrative staff at the school to learn how Quest is focused on preparing students to become bold inquirers, problem solvers, and ethical leaders, skill-ready for post-secondary education to meet the challenges of a competitive global workforce. We will also learn more about how the school is managed by Concept Schools, NFP, and is overseen by a Board of Directors that governs all operations of the Academy.

\$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Tanners Orchard (I)

Monday, September 30, APPROX. 10:30 a.m. - 2:30 p.m.

The roots of Tanners Orchard run deep – literally and figuratively. For more than 60 years, Tanners Orchard in Speer has been a destination for families across the Midwest. The family-owned farm features a bakery, farmer's market, wagon rides, pick-your-own apples and pumpkins, and many children's activities. Spend a beautiful fall day with OLLI as we enjoy a guided tour of the orchard, followed by lunch in the bakery and some free time to explore the grounds. We'll have plenty of time to roam the orchards and pick apples and pumpkins after lunch, too.

Quest Charter Academy Middle School (1) Thursday, October 3, APPROX. 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Quest Charter Academy Middle School is a public charter school located on Bootz Avenue in Peoria that provides its students with a curriculum rich in math, science, and technology. During this trip, meet the administrative staff at the school to learn how Quest is focused on preparing students to become bold inquirers, problem solvers, and ethical leaders, skill-ready for secondary education to meet the challenges of a competitive global workforce. We will also learn more about how the school is managed by Concept Schools, NFP, and is overseen by a Board of Directors that governs all operations of the Academy. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

A. Lucas & Sons Steel (2) Friday, October 4, APPROX. 8:45 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Steel fabrication company A. Lucas & Sons Steel was founded in 1857 by German immigrant Adam Lucas. The building, with its iconic STEEL logo, is one of Peoria's landmarks located on SW Washington in downtown Peoria. The Lucas family kept the business afloat throughout the Depression, and the company guaranteed workers' jobs when they returned from World War II. Today the company is owned by the Hanley family and is proud to be the oldest continuously operating steel fabricator in America and the oldest manufacturing business in Peoria. During our visit, the fifth president of the company, Margaret A. Hanley, will help us learn more about the company's long history of strong employee relationships that have helped withstand economic downturns. We will also have an opportunity to see the fabrication process and learn what the future holds for this small family owned company. \$22 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van transportation

Excel Foundry & Machine (2) Monday, October 7, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

On this trip, we'll travel to Pekin and visit Excel Foundry and Machine, which specializes in the design, manufacture, and supply of replacement parts for equipment used in open pit mining and aggregate production. During the tour, we'll learn how the company engineers site-specific spare parts for cone crushers, hydraulic excavators, electric rope shovels, and more. We will also learn how the company, in order to boost production capacity and employee growth, recently completed a 121,000 square-foot warehousing and processing center, a 16,000 square-foot foundry addition, and an 11,000 square-foot corporate office facility. Staff members will discuss how production capacity – plus area employment – has been increased as a result of this expansion.

Peoria Marriott Père Marquette (1) Tuesday, October 8, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

The Peoria Marriott Père Marquette, a 12-story hotel in downtown Peoria, was built in 1926 for \$2.5 million. The hotel was named for Father Jacques Marquette, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places; interestingly, it is located directly across the street from the Madison Theatre building and a half block from Peoria City Hall, both of which are also on the National Register. In 2011, the Peoria City Council approved an agreement with developer Gary Matthews to temporarily close the Père for an extensive renovation and expansion into a full-service, upscale Marriott hotel. On this trip, we will take a guided tour of the newly opened hotel and get a look at some of the 286 guest rooms and 18,840 square feet of meeting space.

Muir Omni Graphics (2)

Thursday, October 10, APPROX. 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Muir Omni Graphics, a second-generation family-owned business and leading manufacturer of industrial graphics, is marking its 50th year in business in 2013. Since 1963, the company has provided leading manufacturing companies and service organizations with decals, fleet markings, corporate identity labels, and specialty graphics. Our tour will consist of an in-depth look at how the company takes an order and processes it through the production shop. We'll also get a closer look at the pre-press operations and the silk screen printing manufacturing process.

\$22 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van transportation

Peoria Houses of Worship (2) Tuesday, October 15, APPROX. 9:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

Get a closer look at the beliefs, architecture, and history of four beautiful Peoria houses of worship when we visit St. Mary's Cathedral, University United Methodist Church, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, and Grace Presbyterian Church during this daylong tour. Architect Ed Barry of the Farnsworth Group will accompany our group to provide architectural insight about each building, and church representatives will be on hand at each stop to discuss the stained glass, customs, and diversity of religions observed at the facilities. Where applicable, we may also be able to enjoy music at some locations. Participants should be prepared and able to enter and exit the vans frequently throughout the day.

Peoria County Coroner's Office (1) Thursday, October 17, APPROX. 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Our visits to the Peoria County Coroner's Office have proven to be some of our most intriguing, engaging, and educational Learning Trips. On this day, we'll learn about the responsibilities of Peoria County Coroner Johnna Ingersoll, an elected official charged with investigating sudden, unusual, and traumatic deaths and assuring those bodies are examined, identified, and if necessary, autopsied. Since her election in 2004, Johnna has been responsible for overseeing investigations of more than 2,000 deaths annually. Our visit is expected to include an observation of a jury inquest, which is held weekly to determine the manner of some deaths occurring in Peoria County. In addition, if it is not being used during our visit, we'll also have an opportunity to see the on-site autopsy room and morgue.

182nd Airlift Wing, Illinois Air National Guard (1) Tuesday, October 22, APPROX. 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The 182nd Airlift Wing, Illinois Air National Guard, is a diverse group of citizen-airmen from our community serving the nation's call to duty. It also maintains and operates eight C-130 Hercules aircraft capable of transporting large amounts of personnel and equipment over long distances. During our visit to the base in Bartonville, Colonel William Robertson ('83), the Wing Commander, will lead a tour to explore the Wing's mission to include the maintenance, flying operations, and air support to the Army, Security Forces, and much more. He'll also provide an update on the Wing's current worldwide missions. Van transportation will be provided for 20 participants; up to 75 other participants may register and drive on their own. Lunch will be catered on-site at the base.

PDC and Peoria County Landfill (2) Thursday, October 24, APPROX. 10:45 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Join OLLI and member Les Bergsten, Chairman of the Peoria City/County Landfill Committee, for a visit to the Peoria Disposal Company (PDC) offices and a tour of the landfill. As the City of Peoria's waste and recycling collection service contractor, PDC handles hazardous and non-hazardous waste collection and disposal, waste treatment, waste transportation and brokerage, consulting and engineering services, laboratory analysis, and equipment rental. During our visit, we'll discuss the history of the landfill, get an update on the construction of Landfill #3, and see the actual operations of the landfill in Edwards. Due to space restrictions at PDC, this trip is limited to 16 participants.

South Side Mission and Culinary Arts School (I) Friday, October 25, APPROX. II:00 a.m. – I:30 p.m.

The South Side Mission, Peoria's oldest rescue ministry, has been serving the poor since 1925 through its homeless shelter, youth ministries, and career training. On this trip, we'll get an insider's look at the Mission's Culinary Arts School, a full-time program designed to help under/unemployed men and women train for careers in the hospitality industry. During our visit, we'll tour the facility, learn how the program is helping its graduates gain employment in Peoria's finest commercial kitchens, meet Chef Chris Franzoni and his students, and dine on lunch specially prepared by the students.

\$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Peoria Library Branches (I) Monday, November 4, APPROX. 9:00 a.m. – I:30 p.m.

Join us as we take a closer look at two branches of the Peoria Public Library – with an additional stop at the Bookmobile! On this trip, we'll visit the McClure Branch, which was rededicated last year after an extensive renovation project that included new windows and doors, sidewalks, railings, a parking lot, and wireless Internet connection throughout the 76-year-old building. Next, we'll head to the Lakeview Branch, which was the last branch to be remodeled in the library's overall \$28 million renovation project. Lakeview features a new central information desk, call center and self-check desk, plus 16 new public computer stations, new furniture, and new windows and flooring. Our last stop of the day will be a visit to the Bookmobile, a fully stocked library on wheels with a wide variety of books, magazines, and DVDs. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Wayne Printing (I)

Tuesday, November 5, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

On this trip, we'll take a private tour of the company that prints, binds, and mails the OLLI brochure! Founded in 1963 by Wayne Owens, Wayne Printing started as a small home-based business. As the business grew and prospered, it moved to a larger facility in Mount Hawley Industrial Park and entered the four-color process commercial printing market. In 2001, the company moved into a new 37,000 square foot facility located in Edwards and added new state-of-the-art printing equipment including computer-to-plate technology, along with variable color capabilities and multi color presses ranging from 12 X 18 up to 28 X 40 in size. During our tour, we'll learn all about the printing process and find out how the company's direct mail division has helped it become a "one stop shop" for many of its customers.

Midwest Food Bank (I)

Wednesday, November 6, APPROX. 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Midwest Food Bank, a faith-based, ecumenical nonprofit organization 501(c)(3), was founded in 2003 when the Kieser family began providing food out of a building on their family farm in McLean County. Today, the organization serves more than 600 food pantries and organizations throughout the Midwest with warehouses in Bloomington, Peoria, Morton, Peachtree City, and Indianapolis. Join us as we tour the Peoria facility and talk with Terri Campion about the donations, distributions, and volunteers that allow Midwest Food Bank to feed more than 225,000 people each month. We'll even get "handson" during our visit to help prepare food for a delivery. \$22 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van transportation

FOLEPI Floatmaking & East Peoria Development Update (I)

Monday, November 11, APPROX. 9:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. Just days before the East Peoria Festival of Lights parade, you'll have the chance to see the "Folepi Construction Company" and some of its "employees:" a merry band of volunteers who design and build the 40+ floats. During our tour, we'll meet some volunteers who work year-round designing, welding, and maintaining the floats (and their 500,000 lights) and learn how the floats evolve from concept to actuality. We'll be both indoors and outdoors admiring the floats as they are prepared for the parade, so be sure to dress accordingly! In addition, Chamber of Commerce Director Rick Swan will provide an informative presentation about the latest commercial developments throughout the City of East Peoria, including details about the new Levee District, a business district that opened in mid-2013. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

EP!C(I)

Tuesday, November 12, APPROX. 8:45 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

Formerly known as PARC, EP!C (Empowering People, Inspiring Capabilities) has been serving individuals with developmental disabilities and their families for over 60 years. EP!C was founded by a group of parents of disabled children who wanted to provide their children with services to meet their special needs and give them every opportunity for a full life. Take a behind-the-scenes look at EP!C and learn how a program originally organized to serve ten children with disabilities now annually serves over 600 individuals and their families – people of all ages with many kinds of developmental disabilities including, but not limited to cerebral palsy. Down Syndrome, autism, and epilepsy. During our tour, we'll learn about the programs and services offered to assist those with developmental disabilities and their families. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Midland Davis Corporation (2) Friday, November 15, APPROX. 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Midland Davis Corporation can trace its roots back to 1892, when a 20-year-old immigrant named Louis Livingston began collecting pieces of discarded iron and steel to sell to local foundries and mills. During our tour of this Pekin business, we'll learn how the fifth-generation company has evolved into a full-service recycling provider that processes more than 168,000 pounds of cardboard, 42,000 pounds of newsprint, and 21,000 pounds each of paper and co-mingled plastics each week. During the tour, we will also learn more about the company's fleet of roll-offs and tractor-trailers, its new 5/8" fine paper shredder, and see first hand how recyclables are baled and sorted. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Peoria County Jail with Sheriff Mike McCoy (2) Tuesday, November 19, APPROX. 8:45 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Peoria County Sheriff Mike McCoy will lead a behind-the-scenes tour of his department and the attached jail while providing a narrative about the county's law enforcement services. McCoy will explain how highly qualified officers handle criminal investigations and protect Peoria County residents, improve the quality of life by reducing the fear and incidence of crimes, and work in partnership with the community. We will walk through the lockup portion of the facility and experience the jail's newer technological advances, including a closed circuit bonding system, computerized mug shot and booking system, and a live scan fingerprint process system. Participants will also get to participate in an interactive indoor shooting range and eat lunch on site with the Sheriff.

We'll explore the Modern Wing, a 264,000 square-foot addition designed by Pritzker Prize-winning architect Renzo Piano, and its amazing selection of contemporary art. In addition, participants will enjoy a keynote lecture in Rubloff Auditorium (topic not yet available at press time), experience docent-led presentations in front of many of the museum's masterpieces, and watch artist demonstrations throughout the museum. Jean Gronewold, a painter, teacher, and frequent OLLI instructor, will join us to enhance our experience of the exhibitions, some of which will include "Impressionism, Fashion, and Modernity," and "Tomoaki Suzuki Sculptures."

Monmouth (1)

The centuries before the Common Era in China witnessed a proliferation of philosophical proposals on the nature of human beings, morality, and the conditions necessary to create a harmonious society. Confucianism, which represented the earliest of these philosophical proposals. historically became the dominant shaper of the Chinese worldview and value system. This Study Group will consider three of the most important texts in classical Confucianism: The Analects of Confucius, The Mencius, and The Xunzi. The group will explore these texts both as products of a particular historical and cultural setting and as articulations of universal wisdom addressing perennial issues within human existence. While the content of this course is related to the theme of last semester's Study Group on Daoist texts, no background or previous knowledge will be required. The historical, cultural, and linguistic context for understanding the readings in this Study Group will be provided during the sessions. Required texts: Confucius: The Analects, translated by D.C. Lau, Penguin Books; *Mencius*, translated by D.C. Lau, Penguin Books; and Hsun Tzu: Basic Writings, translated by Burton Watson, Columbia University Press. The Peoria Nation – 1673 to 1773: Years of Severe Change Mondays, October 7 – November 4 1:30 – 4:00 p.m.

The Peoria Nation was a strong and influential member of the Illinois Confederacy when it met Joliet and Marquette in 1673. For the next 100 years, all the indigenous peoples that lived in the upper Mississippi River Valley experienced a dramatic, and sometimes devastating, change in their daily lives. This Study Group will explore how the global expansion that was taking place before that first encounter affected Peoria, and discuss the Euro-American rationalization for diminishing the indigenous peoples' culture, land, and resources. After establishing that context, the group will investigate the Peoria Nations' interaction with the French and other American Indian nations, both within and without the Illinois Confederacy. Participants will be asked to do research on other Illinois Confederacy Nations, or an indigenous nation outside the Confederacy that had some impact on Peoria during the time period being studied. The research findings will be shared in a short presentation to the group. \$44 – facilitated by Dave Weiman, co-founder for a national project, with his faith community, to address the rights of indigenous peoples. He has conducted several OLLI Classes about Gilbert and Sullivan operas, and a Study Group on the Doctrine of Christian Discovery.
